## President Represented At Funeral Of Mrs. O'Donovan

President de Valera was represented at the funeral in Limerick to-day of Mrs. Maire O'Donovan by Col. J. J. Fitzsimmons, O.C. Sarsfield Barracks, Limerick.

The late Mrs. O'Donovan, who died on Saturday last, was Deputy Mayor of Limerick from May, 1921, to January, 1922, when, following the murder of her brother-in-law, ex-Mayor Michael O'Callaghan, she was co-opted on the Limerick City Council and deputised for Mayor Stephen O'Mara during his absence in America in connection with the Republican Loan.

There was a large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery, Limerick, to-day (Monday), and the Bishop of Limerick was represented by Rev. M. O'Callaghan.

## Widespread Regret Death Of Well-Known Journalist

The death of Mr. Joseph J. Mulqueen, Deputy Editor of the *Limerick Leader*, at his residence, "Erinagh," Ballinacurra, early yesterday morning has occasioned deep and heartfelt regret.

The deceased, whose death occurred after a protracted illness, was one of the best known and most capable of journalists and enjoyed a high reputation amongst his colleagues in the newspaper world throughout the country. He began his career in the old *Limerick Echo*, which was founded and edited by his brother-in-law, the late Christopher O'Sullivan, and immediately showed considerable promise as a reporter, in which capacity he soon developed a high and accurate sense of news values, as well as a noteworthy discrimination in the discharge of his duties.

The late Mr. Mulqueen joined the *Limerick Leader* Editorial staff over thirty years ago and because of his abilities and devotion to his profession, became in a short time Chief Reporter, a position he held with marked ability up to the time of his lamented death. He was an all-round journalist, widely read and well informed, but also he was invariably guided by the principles of charity, justice and restraint in his work. As the famous T. P. O'Connor, himself a brilliant journalist, once said "a journalist is a public man amongst public men" and the description perfectly describes the deceased, who was "all things to all men" and was never known to break a confidence.

### TACTFUL NEGOTIATOR

Amongst his colleagues the late Mr. Mulqueen enjoyed a special place in their affection and esteem. He played an outstanding part in building up the National Union of Journalists and for many years back had been a painstaking, energetic and highly-successful Chairman of the Limerick Branch. He was for a lengthy period a member of the Irish District Council of the Union. An excellent and tactful negotiator, he was mainly instrumental in
