

1 Councillor Jack Danagher will carry priceless civic emblem on American tour

The Mayoral Chain has links with history

ON to-morrow the Mayor of Limerick, Mr. Jack Danagher, will fly from Shannon to the United States on the invitation of the members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians in Iowa and Omaha. The Mayor will be guest of honour for the St. Patrick's Day ceremonies in these two great centres, and he will take with him on his tour a priceless antiquity of the Corporation of Limerick—the Mayoral Chain.

Only on three previous occasions has the Mayoral Chain been taken outside Ireland. The first was in 1875 when Ambrose Hall attended a week's festivities given to the Lord Mayor and Corporation of London to all the Mayors of the world; the second in 1901 when Danagher's first Fenian Mayor, John Daly, took it with him on a tour of America, and the third in 1957 when the late Mayor, Alderman G. F. Russell, toured America to inaugurate a fund raising campaign for a memorial to Sir John Bull. Michael O'Callaghan, Mayor since 1931, and Volantier Joseph O'Donoghue, who died in Ireland's War of Independence.

Its historic value is priceless, and the records inscribed on its links date back to 1822. It has been present at every function of civic importance for over 100 years. It travelled with John Bull on his tour of distinguished speeches in New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago. With him it participated in New York's great St. Patrick's Day parade of 1861, and with him was present at the great banquet of the Sons of St. Patrick in 1866.

The Mayoral Chain is of solid gold and was originally fashioned by a firm of London goldsmiths about 1850. In its early stages of growth the links were considerably smaller than at present and resemble a flat ring in circumference not much larger than a coin. They had no room for elaborate engravings, and each merely carried the name of the holder of the office.

The links added by the mayors of the Reformed Corporation, however, differed in format, were much greater in thickness and value, and carried a record of local national and world events during each mayor's term of office. They are mainly of the size of a five shilling piece with a circular piece taken out of the centre, thus turning what would otherwise be a medal into a link attached to the other links by a small ring of gold. Other links have two holes diametrically apart and punched near the circumference.

In three instances are the links wholly solid or medal-like, and attached to the chain as pendants. One of these bears the crest of Martin Honan, the first Reform Mayor, with the City Arms on the other side. Honan, by the way, continued to have his representation on the chain as far as Limerick as possible from those of the old Corporation, which went out of office in 1821.

The New York Herald's version conclusively settled the point when it reported that John Daly were the first Fenian Mayor, and spoke of him as one filled with his spirit. He caused himself to be taken that he had been taken up for so long without a chance to talk that he might be ordered pardoned for saying what he should.

The story of controversy and fierce on Daly's return to Limerick's first Fenian Mayor made a forceful report in his critics when, at a banquet given in his honour in the Town Hall, he stated: "My right to take the chain was vindicated by the British and of America, for they said that here is a man who has been in chains for the most part of his life, and Limerick now sends him to us with the golden chain of office."

On a solid medal appears: Martin Honan, Mayor for the years 1842/43. On the back: Municipal Reform Act passed in Limerick, Nov. 9, 1841.

Two links added by the representatives of Limerick's murdered Mayor, George Clancy and Michael O'Callaghan, commemorate the greatest tragedy in the city's 100 years municipal history. The last Mayor to add a link to the chain was Ald. G. E. Russell, who occupied the office for the three consecutive terms, 1934/35, 1935/36 and 1936/37. It commemorates a banquet given by Alderman Russell during his Mayoralty to the 16 surviving former Mayors of Limerick.

The following list of the inscriptions on the links of Limerick's Mayoral chain may be of more than usual interest.

- Hon. J. P. Voreker, Mayor, 1821/22.

 - Sir Richard Franklin, M.D., Mayor, 30th Sept. 1839. (He was knighted during his term of office by Earl Fortescue, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland.)
 - Hon. Charles Smith Voreker, Mayor, 1841.
 - Martin Honan, the first of the Reform Mayors, initiated the practice of recording outstanding events during the Mayoral term of office. The inscription on each link down through the years to our own time is given below.

- On a solid medal appears: Martin Honan, Mayor for the years 1842/43. On the back: Municipal Reform Act passed in Limerick, Nov. 9, 1841.

- Piercey, Shannon, Corbally House, Mayor, Jan. 1st, 1844. On back: Died in Mayoralty, June 6th, 1844.

- THE FLOATING DOCKS—THE POTATO CROP FAILED**
- Edmund F. G. Ryan, Mayor,

1846. Floating docks completed. Total value of the public works, £1000 collected in the city for the year. LIMERICK'S MAYOR, Thomas Wallcut, Mayor, 1847. The Liberator died at 10 o'clock on 14th May. General Wood's John O'Brien and J. O'Connell, son of the Liberator, returned.

ISLAND BANK FOR THE CITY

Michael Quin, 1848. Got possession of the Island Bank for the citizens. Railway communication opened by Mr. May between Dublin and Limerick.

EARL OF ARUNDEN

Thaddeus McDermott, 1849. The Earl of Arundel and Surrey was elected Mayor of the city.

DRIVING BARRIERS OPENED

William Henry Hall elected Mayor 1853. Great Market and outer docks opened by the Earl of St. Germaine.

PUBLIC HOUSES

Henry O'Connell, 1855. Public houses are opened for the first time in the city.

EMERSON VISIT

Henry Wilson Mayor, 1856. Emerson visited the city in 1856. The Mayor this year traversed the land and water boundaries of the Corporation Municipality. War with Russia declared.

SILVER CRADLE

Michael Robert Ryan, J.P., M. J. Jones, Election, 18th May. W. Russell elected third time. Major Galvin elected for the second time M.P. for the city. Silver cradle presented to Mrs. Ryan by the Town Council and corporate officials of the city according to the ancient custom of the city to commemorate the birth of the son and heir on the 20th of January in the year of his Mayoralty. Mayor Ryan invited to record that he registers the ancient Arms of Limerick according to the Car-

INTERNATIONAL

Andrew Hall, declared Mayor for the year 1875 by the Right Hon. Justice Keogh after trial on petition in the Court of Queen's Bench International. The match between America and Ireland. Prigatini Invincible in France, Germany, Russia and Ireland. International Exhibition. Fanny Cheery Hall, crowned by the Mayor by which £120 was realized for the poor.

REPUBLICAN BROTHERHOOD

John Francis Walker, 1876. Thomas P. O'Brien, South Hill, first High Sheriff elected by the reformed Corporation. Creation of Catholic Institute. Laying of the foundation stone of the tower and spire of the Radnor Street Church, Mount St. Alphonsus, which is to be furnished with a grand pediment of bells, all being the gift of Alderman John O'Donoghue Sheriff.

DEATH OF DAVID III

Stephen Hastings, 1878. Elected unopposedly 1st September, 1877. Death of His Holiness Pope Pius IX in the 32nd year of his Pontificate. Congratulatory address to Pope Leo XIII on his ascension. Treaty of Berlin signed July 13, 1878.

ROCK CLUB

The next record is so long that the edge of the link is not visible. It commemorates the founding of the Rock Club, 1879.

YOUNGEST MAYOR

James F. Barry, 1882. Mayor of the City, Limerick, 1882. And Siriam Mire Limerick, 1882. (Though he does not appear in the list, Barry appeared in 1882 as "youngest" Mayor.)

NOLAN'S COTTAGE

William M. Nolan, High Sheriff, 1890. Mayor, 1890-1891. Chairman, Committee of "Garryowen" Sets opened by the Countess of Dunraven, and realized £1000 for Barrington's Hospital. Mayors presented at "Golden Bows" stall. Nolan's Cottage built. School of Technical Instruction for City initiated. Mayor went with deputations to Lord Ingham to draw out of Technical Instruction. Trade and Labour Congress in Limerick attended by Mayor in State. Lord St. John in people's Park inaugurated by Mayor. Garryowen Foot ball Club was founded. On the other side is the Ashin Club with motto "Iris".



Mayor, 1831. Presented address to Lord Lieutenant on assuming the Lord Lieutenantcy of Ireland. Birth of a son to the Prince of Wales. The Corporation Gas Works renovated. Bill for Corkwater embankment promoted by the Corporation.

THOMAS STONEY

Alfred J. E. Tinsley, J.P. Mayor, 1835. General Election—Russell and Gavin were elected for the city. £5,000 expended on sewerage. Distress among the working classes and outdoor relief obtained. The ancient Treaty Stone raised on pedestal. Telt Testimonial Tower commenced. Jubilee fountain erected in St. John's Parish.

CHURCH OF IRELAND

Thomas Boyce, Mayor, 1839. Judges of Assize attended Mass in State with the Mayor and Corporation in their robes, being the first occasion of the kind since the Reformation. Election petition against the city M.P. defeated. Protestant Church disestablished in Ireland.

FIRST EXPERIMENT OF LIMERICK BOAT CLUB

William Spillane, J.P. Mayor, 1870. President of the Limerick Athenaeum and School of Art. Public Free Library and Limerick Boat Club, unanimously elected to each office. Declaration of war between France and Prussia, July 18. Irish Land Act became law, August 1. Corkwater embankment opened October 14, and the first Public Free Library in Limerick opened December 13.

WAR OF PARIS

Robert MacDonnell, J.P. 1871. Siege and surrender of Paris and termination of the Franco-Prussian War. Visit of Earl Spencer, Lord Lieutenant, June 19. Presentation of an address at the Town Hall by the Mayor and Corporation to Colonel M. Maunsell, M.P. for Co. Limerick, on his appointment as Postmaster General.

ISRAELI'S GOVERNMENT

J. J. Cleary, Mayor, 1872. Visit of Earl and Countess Spencer, Lord Lieutenant; address presented from Corporation. Resignation of the Ministry. Formation of a Conservative Government by Mr. Disraeli.

SCATTERY ISLAND

J. J. Cleary unanimously elected Mayor, 1873. Opening of Graving Docks by Earl Spencer, Lord Lieutenant, May 14th. Vote by ballot became law in Ireland. Over 300 citizens invited by the Mayor to accompany his Excellency and Countess Spencer to Scattery Island. Dejeuner on board. Ashantee War broke out. The Irish Eight won the Shield at Wimbledon.

THE BALLOT ACT

J. J. Cleary elected for the third time, 1874. Gladstone's Ministry resigned. Mayor attended banquet June 5 to the Lord Mayor of London. Address of congratulation to his Grace, the Duke of Abercorn, presented by Mayor and deputation of the Corporation at Vice Regal Lodge. First Parliamentary Election under the Ballot Act. Isaac Butt and R.

IRISH TIRE ON MILITARY ROAD

Alderman Jerome Conahan, Mayor 1882-83. Address of welcome presented by the Mayor and Corporation in Dublin to Earl Spencer on his appointment as Lord Lieutenant. Opening of Dublin Exhibition attended by the Mayor and wife. The new Church of St. Michael's built, and St. John's Cathedral spire finished. Most Rev. Dr. Butler, Lord Bishop. The first tree in the Military Road planted by the Mayor. Wellesley Bridge opened free of toll. Gold key presented to Mayor by Harbour Board. Athlunkard Bridge opened. Waterworks taken over. Royal Agricultural Society show and exhibition opened during visit of Lord Lieutenant and Countess Spencer. Bill passed freeing Athlunkard Bridge from toll. Waterworks purchased and taken over by the Mayor.

FIRST NATIONALIST MAYOR

S. O'Mara, Mayor, 1885. Failure of Munster Bank. Visit of Prince of Wales to the Railway Station. Not received by the Mayor and citizens. Resistance to police tax brought to a successful issue. On a supplementary list appears: Stephen O'Mara, Mayor of Limerick, elected M.P. for Queen's County, Ossory division. Home Rule Bill introduced by W. E. Gladstone. The Most Rev. Dr. Butler, Bishop, died, and the Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer consecrated Bishop.

ARTIZANS' DWELLINGS

Francis O'Reilly, Mayor of Limerick three years, 1887-89. Elected M.P. for the City of Limerick, 15th April, 1888. Introduced the Public Libraries Act into Limerick. Turned the first sod of the new Waterworks 5th September, 1888. The Corporation Artizans' Dwellings first created.

YOUNGEST MAYOR

William J. O'Donnell, J.P. Mayor, 1890. Sheriff, 1889. Youngest Mayor on record.

DEATH OF PARNELL

Alderman Patrick Riordan, M.P. The leader of the Irish people, Charles Stewart Parnell, died October 6th 1891. (The Treaty Stone is engraved on one side of this gold medal, Parnell's head being in relief on the other.)

DEATH OF CARDINAL MANNING

D. F. McNamara, 1892. Cardinal Manning died January 14, 1902. Gladstone elected to power on the Home Rule ticket.

All-Ireland Industrial Conference in the Town Hall, Nov. 28. Opened the Tuberculosis Exhibition in the Athenaeum, Nov. 30. Attended the consecration of the Most Rev. Dr. Boylan as Bishop of Limerick in Cavan Cathedral with sword and mace bearers; also Alderman MacNeice and J. H. Roche, Esq., J.P.

ISLAND FIELD HOUSING

P. F. Quinlan, Mayor, 1887/88. Elected Mayor of Limerick 24th of June, 1888. Inaugurated poor children's excursion to Youghal, 20th July, 1888. Pres. de Valera opened Civic Carnival, 2nd Oct. 1888. Entertained Atlantic flyers, Capt. Ford, Lieut. Sabell, 17th May, 1888, who conveyed Mayor's petition to Holy Father, Pope Pius XI. G.A.A. Jubilee Year. Limerick City. Turned sod Limerick's largest housing scheme (330 houses), Island Field, 7th June, '84. Messrs. J. Molloy and Sons and M. Doyle and Son, Builders. Entertained French engineers, 2nd July, 1891. Unanimously re-elected Mayor, 9th July, '84. Apostolic Benediction received from Holy Father, Pope Pius XI, 13th July, 1894. Mayoral Banquet, 13th October, '84, to Limerick's team on victory All-Ireland Hurling Final. Management Act became law, 8th September, 1884. This Mark has the Quinlan Arms in enamel on the back.

MICHAEL B. O'MALLEY

Michael B. O'Malley, Meire, 1948-5. Dligheadoir. (On the opposite side of this handsome medallion the family crest is magnificently worked in relief, with the motto "Terre Marique Potens".)

FIRST MAYOR UNDER THE LIMERICK CITY MANAGEMENT ACT

Alderman James M. Casey. Elected first Mayor under the Limerick City Management Act, 1934-'36. Alderman James M. Casey acted as Deputy Mayor from 7th to 23rd March, 1921, after the murder of the Mayor by British Crown Forces.
