* Making the presentation to the Mayor, Mrs. O'Callaghan said:-

Like most citizens of Limerick interested in the matter, I know that since the year 1822 the custom has grown up for each mayor to mark the end of his year of office by the addition of a link Mayoral Chain, I am aware that on each link or medallion is noted some event of the year deemed worth recording for posterity.

I have always had the intention to mark my husband's year of office in the customary way, but, over the troubled years of the youth and growth of the State, I waited. waited for a time in which the country might appear to be settling down to her real fulfilment, really settling down in an atmosphere of freedom and harmony, to the dervelopment of all her many potentialities, a time to which my husband always looked forward with confident hope and for which, as a lover of his country and an Irish industrialist, he worked and planned.

cide with my year of office. The Mayor proceeded to say that Michael O'Callaghan was a member of a generation that worked and died for the upliftment and advance, ment of their native land. Michael O'Callaghan paid the supreme sacrifleet he had gone, but his memory and his spirit were with them as were the memories of all the other great men who did not wait to count the cost. During the intervening years great changes had taken place in their beloved landgreat changes in the political and social spheres. The people and their leaders irrespective of party had come together to build up the country's prosperity.
