# French connection with Mayoral chain unfolds 

A MOVING link between Ireland's fight for freedom and the heroic French Resistance was uncovered in the Mayor's office this week, when 85 year old Madame Blanche Daly-Placidi from Paris donned the Mayoral chain once worn by her granduncle.

At the reception for Madame Placidi and her daughter Judge Jacqueline Monet hosted by Mayor Paddy Madden. stirring times in Irish and French history were recalled.

Madame Placidi is the grand-niece of former Limerick Mayor. John Daly, (1900) to 1901), whose inscription, in Irish. on the Mayoral chain records his sentence to penal servitude for life in Portland Prison during the land wars.
and she is a cousin of Commedt. Ned Daly who was executedat Kilmainham Gaol. after commanding the Four Courts (jarrison in 1916.

## Relatives

Blanche herself admiss te having inherited the rebelblood, she was sety much involved with the Fiench Resisiance in Aix en Provence during the War.
