French connection with Mayoral chain unfolds

A MOVING link between Ireland's fight for freedom and the heroic French Resistance was uncovered in the Mayor's office this week, when 85 year old Madame Blanche Daly-Placidi from Paris donned the Mayoral chain once worn by her granduncle.

At the reception for Madame Placidi and her daughter Judge Jacqueline Monet hosted by Mayor Paddy Madden, stirring times in Irish and French history were recalled.

Madame Placidi is the grand-niece of former Limerick Mayor. John Daly, (1900 to 1901), whose inscription, in Irish, on the Mayoral chain records his sentence to penal servitude for life in Portland Prison during the land wars. and she is a cousin of Commdt. Ned Daly who was executed at Kilmainham Gaol, after commanding the Four Courts Garrison in 1916.

Relatives

Blanche herself admits to having inherited the rebel blood. She was very much involved with the French Resistance in Aix en Provence during the War.

Several of Commdt Daly's relatives were present at the reception which was organised by Councillor Win Harrington. They included Mr Edward Daly O'Sullivan and his wife Maureen. Nora and Mairead de h-Oir, who recalled the story of how their parents met on the the train on their way to take part in the Easter Rising.

Madame Monet, a great grand niece of Mayor John Daly, who is herself an Appeals court judge in Paris and whose husband Yves is also a judge, said that it was a "very moving occasion" for herself and her mother.

She was well acquainted with the story of the family's part in the fight for Irish freedom, and they were very proud of their heritage.

Emigrated

Madame Placidi's grandfather, James Daly, emigrated with his brother to Australia, but who apparently couldn't tolerate living in a British settlement and finally settled in
