SUDDEN DEATH OF ALDERMAN PETER M'DONALD. M.P.

Alderman Peter M Donald, M.P. for North Sligo died very suddenly on Thursday evening, shortly after ten o'clock, at his residence, Clarinda Park, Kingstown. Mr M'Donald was apparently in the enjoyment of good health, and his death was quite inexpected. He was taken ill shortly before the hour stated, when Dr Mac-Dermott and Dr Newland were summoned, but their skill was unavailing. Apoplexy was the immediate cause of death. Mr McDenald had been for many years engaged in the wholesale wine and grocery business in the city. He was first elected as a Commissioner of Kingstown, and atterwards represented the Mountjoy Ward, in the Municipal Council, and was elected as senior Councillor to the position of Alderman, which position he occupied up to his death. Mr M'Donald, was about 51 years of age. He was High Sheriff of Dublin in 1886, and was an anti-Parnellite. The deceased gentleman was a na-

tive of Kilfmane, Co Limerick.,
