THE FUNERAL.
Yesterday morning the remains of this deeply lamented gentleman were removed from his late residence, Wellington, Minnis Road, for interment at the New Cemetery. Although the hour was unusually early, the funeral was of large dimensions, and was representative of all classes of the citizens, the deceased having been universally respected. The remains were enclosed in a massive oak coffin, heavily mounted, the breast plate bearing the following inscription—

REMINISCENCE OF THE PAST.

The bankruptcy of Mrs. Parnell is the sequel to a tragedy which thrilled all Britain some fourteen years ago. The youngest sister of Field-Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood, she married, in 1887, Captain William Henry O'Shea, of the 15th Lancers. O'Shea and Parnell were personal and political friends, the captain the protégé of "Ireland's uncrowned king."
