SALE OF MILK,  
New Regulations Explained  
To Trade.

Representatives of the various interests in the milk industry were in conference with officials of the Department of Local Government and Public Health regarding the new regulations for the sale of milk which came into operation at the new year. The object of the conference was to secure information as to how producers, distributors, and wholesalers will be affected by the regulations. Two of the regulations concern general and special designations for milk, and the third imposes restrictions on the sale of heated milk. Only three designations may be used in future—“highest grade milk,” “standard milk,” and “pasteurised milk.” The use of expressions like “Tuberculin tested milk,” “grade A milk,” “best nursery milk,” “pure milk,” etc., will be illegal. Officials of the Department who have assisted in the draft of the new regulations gave detailed explanations to those present. It is understood that certain interests consider that the regulations proposed are unduly harsh in some respects.
