JAMES DICKIE, well known Limerick audiences for his recent performances in "Traviata" and "The Lily of the Valley" three years ago, a welcome re-appearance. SLAY PIECZORA, the Polish bass whose performance as Mephistopheles was one of the highlights of last Limerick season, has been engaged to sing Bon Basilio in "Barber of Seville" and in "La Boheme". After training in Italy, he made his in Warsaw Grand Opera. He practised as a tenor in London and made numerous appearances in television before joining the Rosa Opera Company. As a broadcaster, he has many performances with Adlers Wells Opera and principal bass with the Nederlandse Opera in Amsterdam.

The fifth of November, 1962, will be a memorable day for Limerick, because on that day, the Limerick Choral and Operatic Society will have made history. For the first time in Ireland, an amateur group will stage three Grand Operas in a fortnight. They have also the honour of an Irish Amateur Premiere. The glorious past of Operatic Limerick will come to life again as the curtain rises on La Boheme, and surely the ghosts of old Theatre Royal days will mingle with the distinguished gathering to witness and applaud Limerick's First Grand Opera Festival.

EDWINA GREY, returning to Limerick for the third consecutive year, will sing Mimì in "La Bohème" and will be remembered for her previous successes in "Lucia di Lammermoor" and "Faust". Trained in Milan, she subsequently sang leading roles in opera houses throughout Italy, including Rome, Milan, Bologna, Parma and the Reggio Emilia. She has also appeared in Berlin and with the Carl Rosa Opera Company in England, and broadcasts frequently over the Swiss and Italian radio networks, as well as the BBC.

EDNA GRAHAM, the brilliant New Zealand soprano, will sing Rosina in "The Barber of Seville" and Musetta in "La Bohème". Born in Christchurch, New Zealand, she became a frequent broadcaster while still in her teens and won a scholarship to study at the London Royal Academy of Music for four years. On leaving the academy, she joined the Carl Rosa Opera Co. as principal soprano and since then has appeared as guest principal at Glyndebourne, Sadler's Wells, the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden and the Norwegian Opera. With a voice of extensive range, she sings fluently in several languages.



CONNELL BYRNE was born in Sydney, Australia, in December, 1928, and sang leading tenor roles at the Sydney Conservatorium and with the Royal Opera before going to England in 1957, to study under Dino Borgioli. In 1958 he sang with the English Opera and at Sadler's Wells, and in the same year went to Milan to study with Maestri Pessina and Demetri of La Scala. He appeared in "Lucia di Lammermoor" in Monaco and "La Traviata" at San Pellegrino. He joined the Glyndebourne Opera in 1961 and on his first visit to Limerick will sing Alfredo in "La Traviata".

DAVID HOLMAN, the Canadian tenor, will sing the role of Count Almaviva in "The Barber of Seville". He was already well known for his lyric tenor voice, and had wide experience in opera throughout Canada; when he arrived in England to sing with the English Festival Opera. Since then he has appeared with the Aldershot Festival Opera, the Hantsopshire Festival Opera, and for three years with the Glyndebourne Festival Opera. He broadcasts frequently for the BBC and Radio Eireann, and his television appearances include "Pagliacci" and "Music for You".
