The highly talented Piranhahead follows in the footsteps of Ghetto soul funkateer Amp Fiddler, making his debut on KDJ's outstanding imprint. Slightly more house-minded than his comrade, Piranhahead is without doubt a name to watch. "Dreams" is a gorgeous low-slung vocal masterpiece, with easygoing percussion, enthralling synths and devoted vocals. "Momma's Pen" points to the power of the spoken word, as luxurious keys, silky synths and a mirroring bass get down. "U R" is another romantically minded ode, where cascading guitars meet nervous keys and tribute paying vocals.

Taken from Ms. Francis's debut LP, "Look" is another track that displays the vocal prowess of one London's most talented yet highly under-rated singers. The killer mix on this 12" is from Franck Roger, a French artist who has been highly prolific of late, but has often produced backing tracks that don't fit with the vocals he uses properly. Franck's remix here doesn't suffer that problem and is easily one of his finest works to date, as Verna's vocals are draped stylishly over friendly guitars, mellow synths and helpful strings. The original is a stripped down affair whist NoTenshun's remix sees waves of synthetic goodness back those confused vocals.

Not one to rest on his laurels, the boy Quinn and his whores are back in action on Friday, November 19 when they stepo onto the stage of Termites at the Globe. So in case you don't know who he is, here's the skinny.

Well, first off, Damien Rice he certainly aint! After The Hitchers finally came off the road for ever, songwriter, Niall Quinn decided his next mayhem buggy would be called The Pennywhores featuring Alvin Purple's old backing band. The Pennywhores don't do soppy love songs about girls with perfumed hair and scented skin, they play kick-ass gems about football, crap TV shows and slaughter.

Once upon a time, Niall Quinn played the drums and wrote a lot of the songs for Limerick's punk ambassadors The Hitchers, who released two LPs, "It's All Fun & Games 'Til Someone Loses An Eye" and "For The Want Of Some Better TV" in the late '90s.

Niall's new band, The Pennywhores have spent their initial months finding their way through the blood, beer and coffee matted, confused leaves of Niall's songbook finding the tunes that best suit the purposes of all concerned. So far the breakdown has been pretty straight-forward. When Niall wants to play more mellow or acoustic based tunes, he gigs alone. When he feels the nene-ne-ne-need for speed and an upsurge in lump hammer quota – he sends for his 'whores!!! Like Niall, the guys in The Pennywhores were all raised on bands like The Ramones and The Clash so there's always plenty of fuel in their collective tank to burn. "Legalise Murder" is their debut release and will be available in the shops from Mon 8th Nov 2004.
