JR: Okay. Tell me, how did the band form?
And where did the name come from?

VDL: Well, I decided to come up to
Milwaukee to go to university. I spent a
couple of years here and then decided to
audition for a theatre company here in
town called Theatre X. They were
auditioning for a replacement for the
actor Willem Dafoe. So I was auditioning
to replace him when I got a call to come
into the theatre. Willem went out to New
York of course to film, fortune and fame.
At the same time I got to know Brian

then he came over to my apartment and said "Victor, what do you think if we have a band some day we could just call it the Violent Femmes?" So that's really how it started...

JR: You've been around for quite a while...

VDL: Yeah 25 years! Isn't it amazing when you think of these bands that came up at the same time and now they don't exist. Maybe once in a while they'll get together and have a reunion show to try and make some money. But I think we're one of the few that's still around that has been playing all along.

JR: What do you attribute your longevity to?

VDL: Well, having good songs, having a unique stage presence, and also, musically we get to improvise. That keeps us young in front of the audience. We're not just playing those same songs verbatim, we can improvise and give new life to those songs from night to night. And also go off on weird tangents that other bands just can't do.

where he's a little reticent to write new material. The last few experiences the guys had making records for record companies were really bad. I was out of the band for about 9 years when that happened.

JR: Why did you leave the band?


VDL: Well, I just got out of the band at a point where it only made sense for me to do so. Otherwise it would've led to total disillusionment, and a dissolve. The band probably would have ended had I stayed. But I think by me leaving it (it sounds strange to say it this way) it ensured that the band would live on. But now having been back in the band for close to 4 years I think we're better now than we were at the beginning.

Everybody's trying to find their way, everybody wants to make a living at what they do. I don't really cast aspersions on anyone. I like it when people are successful. I'm always looking for new impetus, for things that make me feel 16 again. So you can grab inspiration from anybody; my inspiration happens around the world and I can take this music and make it mean something to somebody else. There's certain people that I still have cult adoration for and I think it's a wonderful thing.

JR: Finally, do you have a message for your Limerick fans or prospective fans ahead of the gig?

Yes. I'm sure that when we do arrive in the fantastically green and loving countryside of Limerick, hopefully Gordon will have two or three saucy limericks to relate to our audience, laughs...
