Who was playing guitar, turning on record decks, getting into costume, reading poetry, showing their paintings or photographs, running charity gigs, or any other number of activities that could slip neatly into the definition of 'event'. And when and where they were doing it. We promised we'd write as best we could, design it up nice and drop it into a host of places where people could find it. We also promised it'd be free to anyone who wanted to read it, the more the merrier etc. Lots of people didn't open the door. But we were young and scruffy, so we didn't mind. A few people did open the door though, more than enough to come to a decision that was no more concrete than "sure we'll do it for three months and see what happens". The first LEG put its foot down on October 01, 2001 in a flurry of giddy excitement that, in all honesty, was visible only within the four walls of our then flat-stroke-office.

Three months came & went & turned into six. All of a sudden we were one year old, then we were five, and this month, October 2010, the Limerick Event Guide prints its 120th issue on its 9th birthday. A different beast now, with an office that doesn't have a bedroom & a hotpress, 5 staff all running in different directions with their own specific boxes to tick before coming back to a table together twice a week to discuss, debate and ferment, a crew of writers, photographers, printers, distributers & well-wishers, and a wealth of experience behind us & new plans & ideas ahead of us. We're already looking forward to our tenth.

Back in the summer of 2001, the goal of the magazine was to try and cover all the activity that was going on in the city that wasn't being covered in a consistent way by the bigger, badder media. There was a large handful of people running a whole lot of gigs, but long before mybook & facespace,



it was very, very hard to let you & I know about it. At the LEG office, we found ourselves in the same 'expensive flyers Vs expensive advertising' arm-wrestle, as we were fond of throwing the odd party ourselves. So about it came, 20 black & white pages with another 4 pages of a scrappy, colour cover that would do it cheaper, realer and in one handy pocket-sized piece. Since then, the LEG has worked hard to promote the acts coming through the city & talk to the people who want to see them. Either as audience of artist, we didn't mind whether you'd sold a million records or none, been to a thousand shows or none, we thought we might be able to help a little. After nine years, hopefully we were on to something.

It's been a hilly, windy, sunny journey since that bright-eyed start. The trip's been filled with conversations with some of the finest international artists who thought to visit us, but one of the biggest pleasures was watching, meeting, listening to & talking to the huge talent that comes from & lives within this little city's walls. A casual glance in any direction at any time of any day will show up talent that you can only sit back, smile & feel warm about. Great bands, great djs, great artist, actors and writers, great photographers, thinkers and talkers..... hundreds of them do their work and lay their head down between Raheen and Corbally, Castletroy & Dooradoyle, on a daily & nightly basis. If we're celebrating number 9, it's them and you we'd like to do it with, which is why on Friday, October 29 our favourite room in Limerick, will host some of our favourite bands from Limerick. That room would be Daghdha Space, St. John's Church, and those bands would be Brad Pitt Light Orchestra, We Should Be Dead and Walter Mitty & The Realists, with the guitar-slinging Nick Carswell & Damien Drea also stage-stepping. There's really no point in a party without an after-party, so it's round the corner to The Loft, where we turn off the guitars & turn on the decks, turn our attention from our favourite Limerick bands to our Limerick favourite djs, and a line up that includes Leon, A2DF, Broken Funk & more to be announced.

We'll be adding to the line up in the coming days and weeks, so stay tuned to eightball.ie or search & like one or both of 'Limerick Event Guide' and 'Eightball PM' on facebook for details direct to your head! We're tired but happy, enjoying where we are and who we're here with. Big thanks and bigger love for all the help and support till now, we hope we returned it.
