

Launch time for the Cranberrys

Local four-piece The Cranberry Saw Us launch their debut cassette single, "Nothing Left At All," at a special gig at the Top Floor, Savoy, tonight (Thursday) and, believe me, this is only the beginning — the start, if there's any justice, of something very big indeed.

The band, Dolores O'Riordan, vocals and keyboards; Mike Hogan, bass; Noel Hogan, guitar and backing vocals, and Fergal Lawler, drums, have already built up quite a following in town and, with other young Limerick bands such as They Do It With Mirrors and A Touch Of Oliver, they should really put Limerick firmly back on the Irish music map.

The first and title track, "Nothing Left At All," is a really strong song that switches from being really lively to, at times, sounding extremely spacious and moody. After you've taken in the track for the first time you immediately realise, unless you've a total dope, that Dolores has a very special voice and that the sheer quality of it will always warrant special mention. It's driven along by some really solid drumming and there's also some fine acoustic guitar in there in places. A fine track.

The second song, "Pathetic Senses," is my personal

favourite. It features some excellent full-sounding keyboards and also has additional vocals courtesy of Miko Mahony (co-producer) and Pearse Gilmore (engineer and co-producer of the tape). It's got more really energetic drumming included and the two guitars and quality vocals round off the whole thing

beautifully. The final track is called "Shine Down" and it's got another slow 'n' moody start that gradually builds into a really rousing offering which features excellent keyboard, acoustic guitar and backing vocals. The lead vocals are again quite wonderful and the bass 'n' drums combination is

very strong. For a debut effort this is really top class and the band and all at Xeric should be delighted with the complete end product (packaging, design, recording, etc.). A big thumbs up and a must for all fans of the band and all fans of Limerick music in general!

It's Obvious play on!

London-based outfit It's Obvious continue their short series of 'live' Limerick appearances on this Saturday night when they appear at Arthurs Warehouse. The band, who played the first of their three dates at The Speakeasy on St. Stephen's Night, are a four-piece who are aiming very much for mainstream chart success with their light 'n' bright non-nonsense brand of pop music.

For their Limerick gigs (the last of which is at Cheers Niteclub, The Desmond, on New Year's Eve) the boys have secured the services of ex-Tuesday Blue keyboard player Tom Jones to tickle the ivories, or should that, I wonder, be the 'plastic-ies.'

The band's line-up is Fraser Graham, drums; Gary Crawford, bass (both of whom hail from Motherwell, Scotland), and local lads Dave Tracy, lead vocals, and Bryan Kelly, guitar.

The demo!

Their five track demo, which was partially recorded at PWL Studios in London with the help of Richard Dowling (Limerick's Stock Aitken & Waterman sound engineer), is extremely instant and has at least two tracks of enormous potential. On the strength of these two songs alone I'd have to say that record company interest, which is already quite considerable, should be fairly intense when the band return to London and start to put themselves about.

The first track, "I'm Coming Back" is a straight-ahead pop song which revolves around a very instant 'n'

me, a song of two very definite halves — the first being a very soft and moody introduction that sounds really good but the chorus, on the other hand (what I'll call the 'other half'), is just a bit on the dodgy side. It does, unfortunately, take from the overall track and, while being an acceptable pop song, is just that bit too weak when you put it up against the other tracks. It does include some lovely keyboard work.

"Wishes" is, pure and simply, a killer of a slow song. It's got a superb chorus, fine vocals and keyboards and some more very tasty guitar and could, given the proper push and prevailing circumstances, be a very big hit indeed.

The penultimate track, "You Took The Sun Away," is another of the lively pop efforts included. It's, again, very chorus based and is driven along nicely by a punchy bass 'n' drums combination. The vocal interaction (lead and backing) is extremely tight and the whole thing ain't bad at all!

The final offering is, as they say, just like keeping the sweetest vino 'till last . . . "Find Another Girl" is really the business. It's a funky 'n' bouncy demoed track as I've heard in a while and the Chic-style guitar really dominates proceedings. The bass-line is also something special and with really instant lyrics, some nice Phil Collins type brass keyboard-isms and its complete overall appeal it could be a really big hit for them.

THE crew at Arthurs Warehouse are now well and truly in the thick of their excellent festive line-up which is, by all accounts, going down a storm with the 'live' musichads in town.

It goes without saying, of course, that their 'biggy' so far has been the return to the stage of Limerick favourites Grannies Intentions on St. Stephen's Night last but there's certainly some more fine gigs to go before the last of that Christmas turkey is polished off.
