

# A PROUD AND MEMORABLE DAY

**SUNDAY WAS a proud and memorable day for the Diocese of Limerick when Dr. Jeremiah Newman, the 48-years-old former President of Maynooth, became Bishop in succession to the late Dr. Henry Murphy who died last October.**

Thousands turned out to pay tribute to Bishop Newman and many stood for a considerable time in the rain to be blessed by his Lordship following the two-hour ceremony in St. John's Cathedral.

For some time before the ceremony was due to start, hundreds gathered round to gain entrance to the Cathedral which was packed to capacity.

Children formed a guard of honour in the Cathedral yard as the clergy of the diocese led the procession from the Sacristy into the Church.

Inside the St. John's Cathedral Choir, under the direction of Sister Mary Power, sang hymns appropriate for the occasion and Mr. Brendan Boyle, B.Mus., St. John's Cathedral, was organist.

There was a very distinguished gathering of Church and State in attendance, led by His Eminence Cardinal Conway, who was Ordaining Prelate, and the co-consecrators were His Excellency, Most Rev. Gaetano Alibrandi, Apostolic Nuncio to Ireland and His Grace, Most Rev. Thomas Morris, Archbishop of Cashel and Emly.

## Concelebrants

Other concelebrants at the Mass were Dr. Newman, Most Rev. C. Lucy, Bishop of Cork; Most Rev. M. Russell, Bishop of Waterford; Most Rev. Michael Harty, Bishop of Killaloe;

Most Rev. E. Casey, Bishop of Kerry, and formerly a curate at St. John's; Very Rev. L. Newman, P.P., Sallins Co. Kildare (cousin of Bishop Newman) and Rev. Andrew Barry, (C.C., Midleton, Co. Cork, also a cousin of the new Bishop.

President Childers headed the distinguished attendance of the laity and he was accompanied by his wife. The Mayor of Limerick, Ald. Patrick Kennedy, wearing his robes and chain of office, and members of the City Council were also in attendance.

The Taoiseach, Mr. Liam Cosgrave, T.D., was also present, as were the Minister for the Gaeltacht, Mr. Tom O'Donnell, and the Minister for Education, Mr. Richard Burke.

Ald. Steve Coughlan represented An Taisiste, Mr. Corish, and the leader of the Opposition, Mr. Lynch, was represented by Mr. Des O'Malley, T.D.

Also present was the former President, Mr. Eamonn de Valera.

## Housebreaking charge

Two Limerickmen were remanded on continuing bail to July 26th by Justice M. de Burca at the City Court. They were Thomas Sheehy, 61 Ash Avenue, Carrow Park, and Joseph Byrnes, 19 Claughaun Road North, Garryowen.

Both are charged with housebreaking, loitering and malicious damage to the amount of £18.54.

## Intent to steal

Remanded in custody for a week by Justice M. de Burca at the City Court was John McCarthy, The Cooperage, Limerick, who is charged with breaking into the lock-up offices of C. Thompson and Sons, Thomas Street, with intent to steal.

## Remanded

At Limerick City Court Joseph Hogan, alias Nipper Hogan, 5 Rose Court, Keyes Park, was remanded in custody with consent to bail to July 30th by Justice M. de Burca. He is charged with indecently assaulting a ten years old boy at Honan's Quay on June 29th.

## Fined £87

At the City Court, Patrick A. Cahill, 140 O'Malley Park, was fined £87 by Justice M. de Burca for using an untaxed motor vehicle at the Dock Road on January 9 last.

Garda B. McCarthy prosecuted and defendant did not appear in court nor was he professionally represented.

## Bound to the peace

A seventeen-years-old Limerick youth was fined £20 bound to the peace for six months and given a suspended sentence of six months in St. Patrick's Institute when he was convicted of stealing three hub-caps from a parked car at Honan's Quay on July 10th.

He was Patrick Clarke, Healy's Field, Corbally, and he told Justice de Burca that he had some drink taken at the time.

When asked where he got it he said from a person who was with him and he denied that he got it in a licensed premises. "That's what they all say," remarked the Justice, who warned Clarke that if he came before him again that he would send him away.

## On continuing bail

A seventeen years old youth Aidan Carmody, Killanure, Brittas, Cappanore, Co. Limerick, was remanded on continuing bail to July 26th by Justice M. de Burca at the City Court. He is charged with the larceny of £103 in cash from a city store.
