FINE Gael are now more confident than ever that they will take an extra seat in Limerick East in the next general election.

Finance spokesman, Michael Noonan, TD, and Senator Mary Jackman were selected to run on

the Fine Gael ticket at the largest selection conven-tion in the constituency

from in the constituency for many years.

Over 700 delegates gathered at the Greenhills Hotel to support the candidates they think will win back the seat that is up for grabs now that Des O'Malley will be etapping. O'Malley will be stepping

Deputy Noonan headed the poll with 281 votes. Senator Mary Jackman got the bulk of Deputy Noonan's surplus, which gave her a poll of 234

They defeated Alderman Pat Kennedy, city councillor, with 202 votes.

Deputy Noonan hopes that Fine Gael now have a good ticket to go on to win the extra seat. "The election campaign can't be too far away now and I'm very pleased that we have the chance to work hard for two seats in Limerick East."

Senator Jackman on her selection said not only is she looking for-ward to celebrating two ward to celebrating two seats in the constituency after the next general election, but also to Fine Gael being back in government. "We will be out day and night on the road. The second seat has been earmarked by many people for me, so here we go."

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Nora Owen, deputy leader of Fine Gael who presided at the convention as chairperson was delighted with the "incredible" turnout. "I get a lift from seeing how everyone here gave their time to come today. None time to come today. None of us could become elected representatives with-out all of your work. Increasingly today more and more people are

proud to say they support Fine Gael."

As predicted in the Limerick Leader last week Cllr Mary Harty from Pallasgreen withdrew her nomination. She said that based on the anomaly of the 'one man one vote' system, she understood that she didn't stand a chance of being selected.

YOUTH SPENDS NGHT NCELL

A THIRTEEN-year-old boy who appeared before Limerick District Court had to spend a night in a cell in Henry Street Garda Station because there was nowhere else for him to go.

The young boy, who appeared before the court on two charges of larceny, burst in to tears when Judge Tom O'Donnell said that he would have to

spend the night in the station.

Judge O'Donnell said that it was "an absolute disgrace" that this was the only place for him to go.

The judge said that he hated having to detain the boy in the station but he had no other option.

The young Limerick boy was remanded to Obertstown on May 30 of this year but was turned away as there was no place for him.

On June 29, the boy was remanded to St Michael's for assessment but was turned away again because there was no room.

The boy was put in Mount Kennet House, run by the Mid-Western Health Board, as a temporary measure.

Judge O'Donnell commented: "I've only been the District Court Judge

here for one year and this young lad has been in court nearly as much as I have. I am not going to allow him to roam the streets of Limerick doing what he has been doing. He's unruly and he should be in St Michael's."


Referring to the current High Court applications involving other youths, solicitor for the youth, Ted McCarthy, said: "He is one of a group of children before the High Court on similar applications. It seems that the State is not providing sufficient funds for providing for these children.'

The boy was remanded overnight to Henry Street Garda station.

The judge expressed his frustration that the 13-year-old offender was on the streets of Limerick committing crime.

He said the youth had been under the Health Board's care but had absconded "despite the best efforts of the Health Board'

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McCabe killer on temporary

A DEPARTMENT of Justice spokesman strongly denied suggestions today that the killers of Garda Jerry McCabe would released next year.

This follows confirmation that Michael O'Neill,

funeral two weeks ago. "The Department Justice are softening up the people for their release. The families expect them out next year," was how the Republican source put it.
