

Society, Solicitor; m Patricia McAleer; 2 s 4 da; joined established family legal practice in Limerick; elected Fianna Fail Deputy for Limerick East 1968; Parliamentary Secretary to the Taoiseach (Jack Lynch), to the Minister for Defence and Government Chief Whip 1969-70; Minister for Justice 1970-73; Opposition Spokesperson for Health 1973-75; Opposition Spokesperson for Industry and Commerce 1975-77; Minister for Industry, Commerce and Energy 1977-80; Minister for Industry, Commerce and Tourism 1980-81; Minister, Trade, Commerce and Tourism, March-October 1982; broke away from Fianna Fail Party, founder/leader Progressive Democrat Party 1985 to date; following the 1989 general election the Progressive Democrats formed a coalition government with Fianna Fail on the basis of an agreed Programme for Government 1989-93; Minister for Industry and Commerce (coalition government) 1989 to date. O'MALLEY, Tony; ARTIST; b 1913; m Jane Harris, Artist; started painting 1947; moved to St. Ives (Cornwall) for a time; worked during winter visits to the Bahamas and Lanzarote; has had group and mixed exhibitions in Ireland, UK, Germany and Belgium since 1951, and one man exhibitions in numerous galleries, including Sail Loft Gallery (St. Ives), Arts Council of Northern Ireland, Taylor Galleries (Dublin), Festival Gallery (Bath), Caldwell Gallery (Dublin and Belfast), Arts Council of Ireland, Castlefield Gallery (Manchester); awarded retrospective exhibitions in Ulster Museum, Belfast 1984, Douglas Hyde Gallery, Dublin 1984, Crawford Institute, Cork 1984; his work hangs in major private collections in England, Canada, Ireland, USA, Switzerland, Australia, Japan, Bahamas, Denmark, Sweden and Germany, and in public collections such as Contemporary Art Society, Cornwall Education Committee, Allied Irish Banks, Bank of Ireland, Arts Council of Ireland, Ulster Museum (Belfast), Insurance Corporation of Ireland, Guinness Peat Aviation; awarded Douglas Hyde Gold Medal (Arts Council of Ireland) 1981, Guardian Art Critics Award for Painting (Tom Hilton) 1989, Irish American Cultural Award (for painting) 1989, Honorary member, Royal Hibernian Academy 1989; member: Newlyn Society of Artists, Penwith Society of Artists, Aosdana.
