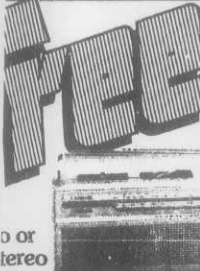

esmond "alley: see it through

DEPUTY DES O'MALLEY has no immediate plans to apply for re-admission to the Fianna Fail Parliamentary Party.

Mr. O'Malley said: "I have no plans to re-apply for admission. I don't see much point in it," he said. "Mr. Haughey, right or wrong, wanted to get me out. He was even prepared to allow discussion of the matter on which he succeeded in getting the party to throw me out and I haven't seen anything to suggest that he has changed his mind, or attitude, since."

"So I presume there is no point in applying."

Convention

Mr. O'Malley envisages going before a Fianna Fail convention before the next election.

Asked if he thought the national executive might try to block his candidacy, he replied: "They might, but I don't think they would be that foolish."

Despite the turn in his fortunes, Mr. O'Malley said he had not seriously considered abandoning the political scene.

"There have been a few occasions when for an hour or two that I felt so dejected off at some things that happened that I considered it, but never seriously."

My future is tied up in politics. I have invested so much of my life in it now that I might as well see it out. I am almost 17 years in the Dail and these have been perhaps the 17 most productive years of my life. I have burned too many of my boats now and might as well see it through.

I do find it frustrating being off the mainstream—I wouldn't say I have gone off the mainstream, but I have been put off it in the sense that I am not in a front bench or government position for the first time in 16 years.

Asked if he would ever see himself leaving Fianna Fail for another party, Mr. O'Malley replied: "No."

Forum report

He did not see his difficulties with Mr. Haughey as irreconcilable, but he said it was interesting to note that a recent Irish Independent survey showed that a substantial majority of people in the country took the same view as him on the Forum report.

His difference with Mr. Haughey over the Forum report led to his election to the Parliamentary Party.

Mr. O'Malley thought the view in the party itself on the issue might have been about 50/50, but the Irish Independent survey showed a significant majority within the party favouring his view.

On the current standing of the

party, Mr. O'Malley said it was a case of concern to a lot of people in Fianna Fail that it was not narrowly ahead of the Coalition at a time like this, when it should appear to be a long, long way ahead.

"I think the Fianna Fail lead should be considerably greater," he added.

He said the situation must be read in the context of a Government that was weak without parallel.

"It would be an amazing situation if the opposition parties in these circumstances were not ahead," he commented.

Government

Mr. O'Malley said the present Government was the most beleaguered one ever in the State's history.

"I have seen weak Governments and Governments in difficulties, but never a Government in quite the trouble this one is in."

Asked if he would be prepared to serve in Government under Mr. Haughey if Fianna Fail was returned to power, he replied: "Not there are a lot of 'ifs' and 'buts' in it. I can't even say for certain that I would be prepared to serve in Government under Mr. Haughey if Fianna Fail was returned to power."

So I think I had better answer that one after an election.

Mr. O'Malley warned of the complacency that had set in throughout the Limerick region and alleged that the region was not getting the "push" it used to politically.

He elaborated: "Very little new industry has been established in the past two or three years. It hasn't been noticed because we have had very little closure of major significance, except for Burlington's latest announcement and Ranks. We have accepted without protest something that is unacceptable and that is there has been no major industrial development in the past two or three years."

Attitudes

"I can't understand why the housing repairs and maintenance in Limerick is infinitely worse than in any other city. It is extremely bad, and pro rata Limerick gets as much money as Dublin and Cork, but the standard of house maintenance is better elsewhere."

He said the fact the Corporation had for so long been so careless about their own property had overflowed a bit into attitudes in Limerick and people seemed to care less about the appearance of the place.

He also slammed the Corporation's "negative" attitude to planning. This, he said, was one of the reasons for the "rather down-trodden appearance of the city."

The unnecessarily stringent attitude by the Corporation was forcing people with commercial plans away from Limerick.

"This attitude by the Corporation doesn't seem to be achieving much other than forcing people away as you can't say the appearance of Limerick has improved because of all the stringent planning controls. I don't think the city has been well run for some time."

Natural gas

He had a lot of sympathy for the Corporation over the manner in which the natural gas issue had been handled by the Government.

He said the ideological rows about who should own it and who should run it were "bloody disgraceful."

He said that if the new company was publicly owned it would be open for all sorts of restrictive controls. He felt it would be much better if it was privately owned and controlled with the Corporation holding a minority interest.

On Fianna Fail's chances of getting an extra seat in East Limerick, Mr. O'Malley said it was impossible to judge because of the "abnormal" situation that existed in the constituency at present over his expulsion from the Parliamentary Party.

"If times were normal and if there was an urban swing to Fianna Fail in a normal situation, I think we could quite comfortably get it. The third Fianna Fail seat is there or is in normal circumstances," he said.

Into Europe?

Mr. O'Malley also discounted any move to the European Parliament.

"The European Parliament doesn't attract me. It is a very

strucous life involving an awful lot of travel. I don't think I would want to commit myself to the constant travel.

There are compensations on the financial side as it is far more interesting in it if you could do more in it. They are slowly building up more significant powers for themselves, but it is a slow job to build them to any meaningful level."

Schemes approved

Deputy Willie O'Brien has been informed that the Minister for the Environment has approved certain documents for the following schemes:

Kilmallock Regional Water Supply Scheme, which will improve the existing water supply in Kilmallock and extend the supply to the areas adjoining the town; Limerick South West Water Supply Scheme (Stage 2B), which will provide improved water supplies to the village of Kilmessy; Cross Sewerage Scheme, which will provide full treatment of sewage and prevent pollution of the River Maigue; Abbeyfeale Water Supply Scheme Extension, which will provide a water supply for the rural area between Abbeyfeale and Athea and the village of Athea; Kilmessy Sewerage Scheme, which will provide adequate sewerage facilities to the village of Kilmessy.

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If proper discipline and care hasn't been exercised on the child, he says.

"I have been approached by many people asking to have parents made liable for damage done by young criminals," Deputy O'Dea said, "but I think we should exercise the powers we have before we start looking for others."

Discipline

Courts, he said, had the right to impose penalties on parents of juveniles if they were satisfied that the parents were conducive to the crime or if they were satisfied that proper care and discipline had not been exercised.

"Whatever about the first, we are falling down on the latter," said Deputy O'Dea. "The courts never ask for evidence of discipline," he claimed.

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
