## Shannon customs deal next week

SENIOR STATE Department officials from Washington led by the U.S. assistant immigration commissioner, Mr. Mervyn Gibson, are expected to conclude a new pre-customs and immigration playance. son, are especial to con-clude a new pre-customs and immigration clearance agreement with the Irish Government early next week, which will be a major breakthrough in attracting thousands of additional flights through Shannon.

#### Extra boost

Under the agreement, homeward bound Americans will be cleared through immigration, health, agriculture and other formalities at Shannon, thus considerably reducing "clearance time" on arrival at U.S. airports.

The new plan will be operated for a trial period next year. Apart from Aeroflot/Aer Rianta contract, it will be the most significant deal in attracting

significant deal in attracting additional traffic to Shan-

# O'MALLEY SAYS: I'M LUCKY TO BE ALIVE!

**DEPUTY DESMOND O'MALLEY** described this week how he escaped death by diving into the passenger seat as the top half of his car was mangled when it collided with the rear of a parked lorry.

Speaking to the Limerick Leader in his first interview since the near-fatal accident, Deputy O'Malley said at his home on the Irish Estates in Corbally that he was "a lucky man to be alive".

Recalling the moment of impact, he said: "I dived to my left and saved my life - the windscreen. everything came in on top of me."

Pointing to the cuts on his face Mr. O'Malley explained how the glasses he wore at the time prevented the glass from the windscreen getting into his

"The glass cut my face everywhere except where the glasses were – even along my nose", he said.
"I came considerably close to being killed. It makes you think that some priorities may not be as important as you think".

This week he went to look at the remains of his car and commented: "It was an awful lot worse to see it from the inside of the car. It was really

lot worse to see it from the inside of the car. It was really horrifying.

"The garage man who brought it in said that he had never seen a car damaged so badly from which the driver came out alive.

"I was still conscious after the crash and my leg was trapped under the brake pedal. I was afraid the car might catch hre—t was really terrifying.

"Some people tried to get me out but I was stuck. I think it was a fireman who crawled in and forced the pedal back".

There was a definite air of relief in the O'Malley home this week as Mr. O'Malley recuperated after the accident which broke his right ankle—he alse received cuts to his face and forehead as well as a deep gash near the thumb on his left hand, the only place where he required stitches.

Following his accident, he spent a considerable time in both Limerick and Cork hospitals, which was followed by a spell in the National Rehabilitation Clinic in Dun Laoghaire.

One of a family of four brothers—Frank, Newcastle West; Timothy, Tralee; John Joe, Tralee, and Gerard, Abbeyfeale—and two sisters, Josephine and Margaret O'Riordan, Patrick now lives with his mother, Rita, at Hill Road. His father died two years before the accident.


