# Mayor's reasons for resigning mayoralty

**Holding meetings for local projects**  
 The Mayor of Limerick, Ald. D. B. O'Malley, T.D., Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Finance, with responsibility for the Office of Public Works, outlined his reasons for his decision to resign the position of Mayor and his seat on the Corporation, at the captain's dinner of the Castletroy Golf Club, last night, given this year in honour of Mr. Arthur J. Quinlan, to whom tributes were paid by several of the speakers. The Mayor mentioned that special meetings of the City Council would be held to deal with important local projects; and he also said that there were great days ahead for this country.

The attendance at the function included (in addition to the Mayor) Very Rev. J. Canon Cowper, P.P., V.F., D.D., Kilmallock; Very Rev. M. J. Talbot, Dean of Limerick; Mr. Jeremiah Dolan, President, Castletroy Club; Mr. A. J. Quinlan, Captain, Castletroy Club; Mr. P. Collins, Vice-Captain, Castletroy Club; Very Rev. D. Rea, P.P., St. Patrick's; Mr. E. Treacy, solr., Chairman, Munster Branch, Golfing Union of Ireland; Mr. T. E. O'Donnell, solr.; Mr. D. G. O'Donovan, solr.; Mr. M. E. O'Malley, solr.; Mr. J. Horan, Captain, Limerick Golf Club; Mr. P. A. Lyons, Captain, Shannon Airport Golfing Society; Mr. L. Fine, President, Limerick Chamber of Commerce; Mr. Michael Herbert M.C.C.

**FROM THE CAPTAIN.**  
 Mr. Arthur J. Quinlan responding, said he had been very happy to be the Club's Captain during the year and it had been one of the great treasures of his lifetime and in his 15 or 16 years membership of the Club. It was only since he became captain that he realised it had such a fine body of people and a wonderfully fine Club spirit. It was true that they had a very successful scratch cup and big entries. That was not due at all to the Captain but to the hard work of the committee.

The Captain then went on to pay tributes to Paddy Collins (Vice-Captain), Kevin Faye, Michael O'Malley, Colonel J. Dundon, Jack O'Connell, Denis Kelly, N.T., Larry O'Brien (steward) and Mrs. O'Brien and Phil Bray and catering staff, Jack Horan, Edward Treacy, and then said they were delighted to have their distinguished Mayor with them that night; not just to have him as Mayor but they were delighted that his ability had been recognised by reason of his Government appointment.

**AWAITING FINALISING OF OUTSTANDING MATTERS**  
 Ald. O'Malley said he would resign as soon as some outstanding matters which he had already begun were finalised.

He had called five special meetings of the Council, the first of these would take place to-night (Monday) in connection with the proposed abattoir and the improvement scheme for the Gas Works. On Friday night next they would deal with the application from Messrs. G. & T. Crampton Ltd., Dublin, for the erection of a multi-store car park in Arthur's Quay. Mr. E. A. Newenham, architect, Limerick, would be also present. After the General Purposes meeting on next Monday night they would consider the proposal for an in-door swimming pool and would meet representatives of the local clubs and the Irish Amateur Swimming Association. An indoor swimming pool was most important from a public health point of view as well as an amenity to the city.

This, he said, was of vital importance to the city at present, especially in view of the new traffic laws.

Other matters included a new abattoir, a new gas works and a new city hall for Limerick.

Speaking generally of the game of golf, the Mayor said that in recent years three Irishmen—Joe Carr, Christy O'Connor and Harry Bradshaw—had brought international goodwill to Ireland. They were, he said, excellent ambassadors and their work stood side by side with that of the Irishmen who had taken a leading place in United Nations' affairs.

He finally paid tribute to Castletroy, which, he said, was only twenty-five years old and yet had established itself as one of the outstanding clubs in the country.

The Mayor emphasised, in referring to the progress the country was making, that nowadays what they did not lack was capital, but what they did lack were ideas. They looked to the future with confidence and there were great days ahead for Ireland and great days for the Irish people.

Very Rev. D. Rea, who also responded, thanked the Committee for the invitation extended to him and expressed his pleasure at being present.

**OTHER SPEAKERS**

Very Rev. Dean Talbot said it had given him very great pleasure, indeed, to be there that night. It had been a delightful evening and it was the first time that he had attended a golfing function and he hoped it would be one of many. "I do thank you very much for having invited me and I hope that your club will go from strength to

strength and that your Captain, for the rest of his term, will lead you to more victories, if there are more victories to be won."

Very Rev. Canon Cowper also expressed his delight at being once again at a captain's dinner of the club, while Mr. Jack Horan, Captain of Limerick Golf Club, paid tribute to Arthur Quinlan. He mentioned that in recent months not only did they hear talk about two clubs in Limerick but they also heard murmurings about a third club.

An enjoyable night's entertainment, well up to the usual Castletroy high standard, followed.

**Fog held up transatlantic aircraft**

**V. Rev. P. Canon O'Connell**  
 Very Rev. Patrick Canon O'Connell, who died at the residence of his nephew at Tiermore, Kilmallock, Co. Limerick, was retired Parish Priest at Beeston, Leeds.

Born in 1880 at Bulgaden, Kilmallock, the late Canon O'Connell was educated at the national school there and at Rathluirc C.B.S. before entering St. John's College, Waterford, in 1895. Having read a brilliant course, he passed to the ecclesiastical college in Leeds and was ordained at Leeds Cathedral in 1903.

He was curate at St. Francis of Assisi, Halbeck, and in 1909 was appointed Parish Priest at Beeston. At the time, the church there was not completed, and he was responsible for completing it and also building a school and later another church.

After celebrating the Golden Jubilee of his ordination, Canon O'Connell retired in March, 1954, and came to live in Kilmallock. He is survived by nephews and nieces.
