ENAMELLED SURFACES.
 An extremely high gloss to prints, on glass, clean it well, dust it with a soft cloth. Wash the glass with enamel collodion and wash thoroughly. When dry, wash the plate until the water runs off freely and greasy streaks. Now prepare a solution of a strength of 20 grains to the ounce, slip the piece of glass into the solution. Bring both into contact face downwards upon the glass. Remove the solution and squeegee the plate. Set aside to dry, and when this is effected, the glazed print may be removed from the plate by running round with a sharp penknife. The gloss thus obtained is of a high order.

A HINT.
 A handy thing in the dark room is of india-rubber tubing of, say, half an inch diameter, one end of which is slipped over the water tap. The advantage of this tube is of sufficient length the stream of water directed to any one of a whole series of dishes over the dark-room bench. The end of the tube shuts off the water when it is desired to move the camera from one dish to another. Another advantage of the rubber tube is that it, like a piece of flannel mentioned above, prevents the rush of water from the tap. The end of the tube can be led to the water tap, and prints or film sections so that clean water is fed in underflows at the top, bearing off with it the dirt left in the prints or films.
