**ARTIZANS' DWELLINGS.**—As a result of the recent inquiry held by Mr Cotton, Local Government Board Engineering Inspector, with reference to an application for a loan of £1,100 for the purpose of erecting seven additional artizans' cottages, the Local Government Board have notified the Town Clerk that the amount will be granted subject to the approval of the site by the Treasury, which, of course, is merely a formal matter.

**WATER WORKS COMMITTEE.**—A meeting of the Water Works Committee was held to-day. Mr David Begley presided, and there were also present—Messrs M Donnelly, J McMahon, Thomas Donnellan, John Bernal, and Wm Bassett. Mr M J DeCourcey, secretary, and Mr Corbett, city engineer, were also in attendance. There were four candidates for the position of caretaker at Newcastle reservoir, the lowest being James O'Mahony at 6s per week, and who was appointed.

**DEATH FROM LOCK - JAW IN THE CITY.**—A labourer named James O'Brien, residing in Coloney street, has died at Barrington's Hospital from lock-jaw, which, it is believed, resulted from an accident sustained some weeks ago. It appears that while engaged at the taking down of Messrs Boyd's premises, which were recently burned, the deceased fell from a ladder sustaining a compound fracture of one of his fingers. Lock-jaw setting in on last Sunday, the deceased succumbed to its effects this morning.

### THE REVISION OF THE BURGESS LIST.

#### EXTRAORDINARY SCENES TO-DAY.

The Revision of the Burgess List was continued to-day by Alderman P Riordan, *locum tenens* for the Mayor, accompanied by the Borough Assessors, Mr T M Brinn, and Mr W Switzer, with the Town Clerk, Mr Robert MacDonnell, J.P, and Mr P S Connolly, Law Adviser.

Mr Stephen Hastings, solicitor, appeared for the Federationists, and Mr J H Moran, solicitor, for the Parnellites.

Others in court were—Mr Thomas Donnellan, T.C; Mr William Bassett, T.C. Mr D Begley, T.C; Alderman Ryan, Alderman J Counihan, J.P; Mr Keenan and Mr Lee, rate collectors.

In the case of Mr Hartigan, T.C, who was objected to on yesterday, and the decision on which was adjourned,

Mr Moran asked to have the objection nullified on the ground of bad service of the objection, which should be given to Mr Hartigan personally or left at the premises, in respect of which he claimed to be rated. That was not done. A registered letter containing the objection was posted to Mr Hartigan on Saturday, the last day of September, but there was no postal delivery at Mr Hartigan's place on the 1st of October.

Alderman Riordan—You maintain it should be served in person.

Mr Moran—It may be served personally, or on the premises. A case has been decided where even leaving the objection in a letter-box is not sufficient.

Mr Hastings—There is no doubt but the service must be personal or left at the house. What he submitted was that it was immaterial how it was left as long as it was left. The letter was posted here on Saturday, and they had the post office receipt. That letter reached Mr Hartigan next morning.

Mr Moran—It is directed to Mr Hartigan, Ballynanty. Those are not the premises claimed.

Mr Hastings—The premises out of which he claims are Ballynanty. He has no other.

Mr Connolly—The premises he claims for are Monabraher, which are within the borough.

Mr Hastings—The whole point of the statute is that the gentleman gets notice; whether he got it at Ballynanty or Monabraher did not make any difference. If Mr Hartigan did not get that notice there is nothing easier for him than to say to the Mayor he did not get it. He would not do that, and though Mr Hastings was looked upon by the court as having done all sorts of bad things, Mr Hartigan was worse because he defied the court.

Mr Donnellan said there was no house on Monabraher.

Alderman Riordan said he would hear nothing from Mr Donnellan.

Mr Connolly, on being appealed to, held the service was bad, even admitting that the course adopted in sending a registered letter was right, and in favour of which the Act of Parliament said nothing. He had inquired at the Post Office and found that a registered letter would not be delivered at Ballynanty on a Sunday morning. The objection, he held, could not be maintained.

Alderman Riordan gave his decision accordingly.
