Mr. Capon said he had great respect for the late Mr. M'Hugh, and for Mr. Kenneally, but it was only a waste of public time to be adjourning the Boards in this way, what he thought would be the most sensible thing to do would be to send a good vote of sympathy to the relatives of the deceased. That would accomplish their object, and they ought to go on with the business.

Mr. O'Molony said he had a resolution also about the death of Mr. M'Inerney, another well-known Ennis man.

The Chairman said the feeling was evident to go on with the business of the Board, and he would do so.

Votes of condolence were ordered to be sent in both cases.

THE FAIRS OF ENNIS.

At the meeting of the Ennis Urban Council yesterday, Mr. Linnane in the chair, a letter was read from the Most Rev. Dr. Fogarty, R.C. Bishop of Killaloe, expressing his willingness to preside at a public meeting in Ennis in connection to the fairs of the town.

Mr. O'Moloney said if something was not done the fairs of Ennis would be a thing of the past in the near future.

The Chairman said the fairs were going away to Limerick, and a last attempt was being made to save the fairs, under the presidency of the Lord Bishop, before they were wiped out altogether.

Mr. Kevin said that the members of a certain society were boycotting the town, and the Chairman said "they ought to be ashamed of themselves."

Eventually a resolution was adopted to have a public meeting called to consider the fair question and guaranteeing the full support of the Council in any decision arrived at. The town staff was also empowered to clear the streets of any cattle exposed for sale on Thursdays before the fair days proper.
