#### DROWNING FATALITY IN THE CITY.

The body, of a man, apparently 45 to 10 years old, was recovered from the river yesterday morning close to the Steam Boat quay. At first it was thought that the deceased was a seaman belonging to one of the vessels in port, but on enquiry it was ascertained that this was not so, and the man's identity remained unknown up to a late hour last night. The deceased had a silver watch, with a gold chain attached, and a sum of £4 13s, on his person, and the watch stopped at the hour of half past three. The body was recovered at nine o'clock yesterday morning, and the man's attire being scmewhat like that of a seaman led to the presumption of his being a sailor. Sergeant Wickbam, in charge of the Dock Station, made a diligent search to ascertain who the man was, but without success as stated. There were no marks of any secious violence on the body, and the constabulary had no satisfactory evidence to show how deceased got into the water.

#### The Body Identified.

Last night the body was identified as that of Constable Patrick Prior, Royal Irish Constablery. Deceased was 45 years of age, and unmarried, and had a service of eighteen years. He was stationed at Carrigaholt, Co. Clare, and was on leave. It is not clear how he got into the river
