## Showdown Shannon between Mississippi and Kennedy

THE showdown early to-day between the Mississippi State officials, police, students, of the all-white Oxford University, on one side, and the Mississippi National Guard, acting under Federal orders and Federal command, on the other, cost two lives and injuries to 75 persons, when rioting broke out outside the University as Mr. James Meredith, a negro and a former U.S. Air Force man, sought admission.

The rioting took place in defiance of an appeal from President Kennedy, who throughout the night and morn-ing conferred with advisers and appeared in a nation-wide television call to avert a clash between the rival interests. depressing

One of the two killed was a cor-respondent of the "Daily Sketch," a London daily.

The rioting began at about dusk last night when 2,000 people were involved, and at a time when Meredith arrived at the campus.

The students who supported Governor Barnett in his opposition Meredith to enrol in the university, were armed with clubs, bricks wrapped in towels, and bottles filled-

When Meredith arrived the University authorities said they could not register him, as it was Sunday, but were prepared to house him in accordance with the Court ruling. By midnight the number of rioters had whittled down to 100,

and the University buildings were shrouded in tear gas. At one stage many of the rioters broke off the fighting to watch Pre-

sident Kennedy on his 10-minute .TV appeal, but went back to resume heir attacks. Order was restored when Federal

troops arrived from nearby towns.

Meanwhile, Meredith is to make another effort to enrol in the University.

A week ago the University authorities before they were supplemented by the arbitrary deision of Governor Barnett, had agreed to enrol Mr. Mr. Meredith.
