Life of Edmund Rice recalled at Mass

LONG before the term 'development' was devised, the founder of the Christian Brothers of Ireland, Edmund Ignatius Rice, understood that the cause of the poor was served not only by emergency relief but also through development, the Archbishop of Dublin, Dr Desmond Connell, said yesterday.

Speaking as principal celebrant of a Mass at St Andrew's Church, Westland Row, Dublin - which was attended by the Taoiseach, Mr Reynolds, and his wife, Kathleen - to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the death of Brother Rice, Dr Connell said this concept of development, and the forpopulation of a sufficiently educated to manage a democracy, was essential to Ireland's modern progress from the Act of Union to independence.

In his homily tracing the life of Brother Rice, Dr Connell said he had been born in 1762 near Callan, Co Kilkenny. He founded the religious order after his pregnant wife, Mary Elliott, died following an accident and their daughter was born severely handicapped.

After the accident, Brother Rice considered withdrawing from the world as an Augustinian lay brother but was swayed by a woman who challenged him to follow the example of the Presentation Sisters, who were already caring for poor girls. He sold his business, made provision for his daughter and established a school for young boys in Waterford.

"I cannot even sketch the growth from that burst of seed," said Dr Connell, adding that Brother Rice went on to expand the role of the Presentation Brothers and his work led to the eventual establishment of the Congregation of the Christian Brothers.

The chief concelebrants of the Mass were the Bishop of Down and Connor, Dr Patrick Walsh, and the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Dr William Lee.

The Presentation and Christian Brothers commissioned Micheal Ó Suilleabhain to compose a Mass reflecting the Gaelic spiritual tradition that influenced Brother Rice and his followers. Missa Gadelica was sung by, among others, Nóirín Ni Riain and four sean-nós singers. The music was played by the Irish Chamber Orchestra and the 90-minute Mass was broadcast live by RTE.

The President, Mrs Robinson, sent a message of congratulations.
