## DOCK LABOURERS CONCILIATED.

After all the hub-bub about the maintenances, etceteras, of their just rights through the medium of their society, and a united front, the stevedores have succeeded in conciliating the dock labourers. The crux that some time ago arose in connection with the unloading of vessels at the docks has now ended, and the old method of stevedoring, so to speak, reverted to on the amending of certain conditions. It is stated that a regular agreement has been entered into between the stevedores on the one hand and the dock labourers on the other, by which the latter waive all claim to the direct discharging of cargoes. The conditions set forth are—Coal baggers to receive in future to receive 6s a day, fillers, winchers, and tub canthers, 7s, with a reduction of an hour daily in their working hours from the 1st November to the 1st March.
