

# CORAS IOMPAIR EIREANN

## Transport Act, 1958

Pursuant to Section 19 of the Transport Act, 1958, the Board of Coras Iompair Eireann hereby gives notice as follows:-

- 1. On and from 6th September, 1976, Dromkeen Station will be closed to passenger traffic and to merchandise traffic by passenger train.
- 2. As an alternative for the carriage of passenger traffic in the area of the said station, the Board will provide the following alternative road transport services:

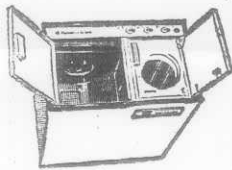
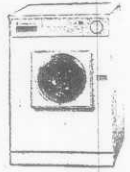

# Council Elects Russell Mayor

## O'MALLEY ADVOCATES ROTATION OF OFFICE

SENATOR George Edward Russell (F.G.) was elected Mayor of Limerick for a fifth term by 10 votes to 5 for Cllr. Clem Casey (F.F.) at Monday night's meeting of the city council. He had the full support of the Labour Party.

On an occasion devoid of the traditional lively atmosphere, and heckling, the two non-party members, Mr. Michael Crowe and Mr. Jim Kemmy, both abstained from voting. Even during the outgoing Mayor's address, there was little applause. And, indeed, Cllr. Thady Coughlan did mention criticism made of his youthfulness on his election twelve months ago but even this did not spark off a comment from the packed gallery. Proceedings began with the address by the outgoing Mayor, Cllr. Coughlan, who said that he hoped that he had given satisfaction to the majority of the citizens. "Anyone who thinks that he could please all the people all the time should be in St. Joseph's," he said.

Mayor Coughlan referred to the drop in the unemployment figures during his year of office and he said that there were 500 more people working now than when he became Mayor.

Intense  
Cllr. Coughlan went on: "In a year of intense economic difficulties, which everybody now knows were not peculiar to our national economy but part of a general world-wide depression in trade and industry. I was glad to participate in a number of industrial developments which show that the mid-western region was still adhering firmly to a policy of industrial expansion and improvement."

Tribute  
Earlier, Mayor Coughlan had paid tribute to his wife, Kay, for her patience during the year, to those who had acted as baby sitters for him, to council members, to the Press, to Mr. Barry O'Mara, and to all the citizens who had helped him during the year.

Regretted  
Senator Russell expressed his deep appreciation to the members of the Coalition for electing him, and said that he regretted it was not an old and personal friend, Cllr. Casey, who was defeated.

Unemployed  
Speaking about the suggestion that the fifth term of office was a record he explained that in the 14th and 15th centuries the office of Mayor was held six, seven and eight times.

Second time  
Proposing Cllr. Clem Casey, Fianna Fail, Cllr. O'Malley said he was doing so for the second successive year. "I think there is a very considerable desire amongst the citizens that Cllr. Casey should be Mayor," he said, and added that Cllr. Casey was jointly the longest serving member of the council who had never been mayor. "He is more deserving of office than anyone else on the council," he said, and added that he had shown his ability by the manner in which he had acted as deputy mayor over a number of years.

Depot  
He called for a new maintenance depot on the north side of the city which, he added, had in the region of 3,000 houses - the size of some small towns. He said he would like to see a new City Hall and a third bridge over the Shannon. "The most needed is the third bridge over the River Shannon," he declared.

Liberal  
The Mayor went on to say that he would make liberal use of his own or his party's but were expressed by Chrs. Lipper and Leddin on previous occasions.

Political  
Cllr. O'Malley declared: "We saw here tonight an example of political factors over-riding all others."

Repairs  
Cllr. Crowe said that he would stay on the subject of repairs and stressed that the Corporation takes rent and rates each week and yet falls down on job of repairs.

Stray dogs  
The meeting discussed the very real problem of stray dogs in Limerick and Cllr. Crowe was generally agreed that the long term solution lay through communication with the children. By nature children are fond of animals and this instinct must be encouraged through to later life.

Jim Kemmy took a phrase from Alderman Kennedy's address - that Senator Russell had a sense of despatch and declared that democracy certainly got despatched at the election not to mention Cllr. Casey. He felt the whole election was unnatural and added that if there was to be rotation himself and Cllr. The Annual general meeting of the Limerick and Clare Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals for the year ended December 31st, 1975, was held at the Royal George Hotel, Limerick, on Friday, June 25th. The meeting was chaired by Mr. Brendan Purcell, and among those present were Mrs. Frances Condeil, president of the society, and Major Protheroe-Beynon, administrator of the Irish Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Letter  
Major Protheroe-Beynon, on his address, congratulated Mr. Purcell on his report and pointed out that the Limerick Leader, which highlighted the financial problems of the society and the stray dog problem, was caused by carelessness and lack of control by the owners. The Mayor then gave a most interesting talk on the effects of rabies and what it would mean if this dreadful disease should reach Ireland. All wild life, he said, within a thirty-mile radius of an outbreak would have to be destroyed. All pet dogs and cats not confined would be rounded up and put down. The consequences would be enormous and it is the duty of all public spirited people to see that animals are not smuggled into this country.

Alderman Pat Kennedy added his congratulations to Senator Russell and put curb on the type of monologues indulged in by Cllr. Kemmy. Cllr. Clem Casey also congratulated the Mayor. He said if there was a record for the person with the most defeats in the Mayoral election he must hold it himself. He wished the Senator well. Alderman Lipper stated that his integrity had been questioned on the matter of rotation. He pointed out that a few years ago when he was proposed for a second term as Mayor he declined because of his commitment to rotation. He said that some time ago Cllr. Kemmy wanted the position of Mayor to be done away with and now he wanted a slice of the cake himself. Ald. Lipper offered his congratulations to Senator Russell and said he would give his full support to the Mayor. The City Manager, Mr. T. F. McDermott, wished the new Mayor well and promised the co-operation of the Corporation staff. Senator Russell referred to Cllr. Kemmy's remarks about the Capitalist system and asked what one Cllr. Kennedy belonged to. He was a "paper baron". He concluded: "I will do my best."
