LIMERICK QUARTER SESSIONS.

His Honor Mr Theobald A. Purcell, Q.C., County Court Judge, resumed the business of the Quarter Sessions to-day. 400 B 400 M

John Thomas Cope and others, trustees of Mrs Anne Geraldine Crosbie, plaintiffs; Richard J. Gabbett, defendant.

This action was brought by the plaintiffs to recover the sum of £24 15s, being loss and damage sustained by them by reason of injury to trees and plantation and the destruction of same, caused by defendant's horses or cattle taken in as graziers by defendant in Newgarden demesne,

as graziers by determant in Newgarden demesne, the property of the plaintiffs, in the months of Noyember and December last."

Mr Brereton Barry, B.L. instructed by Mr Blood-Smyth (Messrs Sellors and Fitt), appeared for the plaintiffs; and Mr H. Blackall appeared for the defendant.

The defence was that there was no injury done to the trees of any permanent nature, and that only nine that could be called trees at all, were barked or injured in any way. The remainder only nine that could be called trees at all, were barked or injured in any way. The remainder were saplings, growing on the top and out of the sides of some of the fences from the roots of trees which had been cut down. Furthermore, as a matter of law, Mr Blackall asked the Judge to hold that if the trees were excepted out of the demise, the landlord was bound to provide proper fences for the protection of the trees from the trespass of cattle.

trespass of cattle.

The plaintiffs' agent, Mr Robert L. Brown, J.P., was examined and gave evidence as to the injury for whichihe claimed, and produced as a witness Mr Madden, George-st., who gave evidence as to the amount of damage. He stated that if the trees

were protected from trespass and allowed to grow to gross timber their value would be £24 15s. The defendant, Mr Cabbett, in examination stated he was tenant of the lands since '67. stated he was tenant of the lands since 87. When he received Mr Brown's letter of the 30th December last he went over the lands for the purpose of seeing what injury, if any, was done to the trees, and found that there were only nine trees that could be considered in any way injured, and none of these, in his opinion, were permanently injured. He had the horse which was grazing on the land removed, to prevent a repetition of the injury to the trees, and communicated the fact to Mr Brown. He did not consider there

was any permanent injury done.

Mr W. G. Gubbins, who inspected the place, was examined for the defence, and corroborated in detail the evidence of Mr Gabbett.

Mr J. B. Barring on was also examined, his evidence in effect being that there was no injury done.
