

Mr. Johnston dealt with all aspects of machine milking, and particular emphasis on such dry jobs as thorough cleaning parts immediately after milking. He also advocated the necessity of some receptacle containing water to dip the teat cups in before putting them on the next cow and so avoid the all too common disease of mastitis.

Johnston dealt at length with the whole procedure incidental to the milking of a herd, and with the complete management of a machine to obtain the best results. Any questions were put to the speaker by farmers having difficulty with their machines, and also by farmers contemplating the purchase of such machines. To all, Mr. Johnston replied in his usual excellent manner. At the conclusion, a very hearty vote of thanks was proposed by the Chairman, Mr. Carmody, seconded by Mr. McNamara, and passed. Mr. Johnston suitably replied, and thanked the Secretary of the Club for his work in organising the exhibition.

Chapdelaine, Counsellor to the Canadian Embassy at Bonn, who arrived at Strasbourg on Monday as observer at the Council of Europe proceedings.

"If that can be brought about," he said, "dollars will be earned automatically." He agreed that Irish trade with Canada was in a "lop sided" condition, with imports from Canada running about ten times as high as Irish exports to that country.

"I think," he suggested, "that the balance might be made more reasonable by exporting Irish tweeds to Canada. There is a very definite market for that very fine material there."

INFANTILE PARALYSIS
CO. LIMERICK CASE
REPORTED

It is reported that a case of infantile paralysis has occurred in Co. Limerick.

Our reporter interviewed Dr. MacPolin, Limerick County Medical Officer of Health, and he confirmed the report.

On being asked concerning the disease, Dr. MacPolin stated that there was a severe outbreak in England and the Six Counties. The disease presents a difficult problem to the public authority, because very little was known about its mode of spread, and it had been established that diphtheria immunisation played a small part in inducing the paralysis. The position arising from this fact is almost insoluble.

HEAVY ACCIDENT TOLL IN
BRITAIN

It was stated in London to-day that 20,800 accidents occurred in Britain last month. This is an increase of 3,000 on the figure for July of last year.

The number of persons killed in Britain last month was 430, which was stated to be lower than the figure for the previous month.
