CYCLISTS WHO REFUSED TO HALT

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE CASES

Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J., adjudicated Askeaton Court on Monday. Sergeant Flaherty summoned E. O'Connor, Murroe, Co. Limerick, for driving an untaxed motor car on November 2nd. Mr. T. O'B. Kelly, solicitor, Limerick, appeared for defendant.

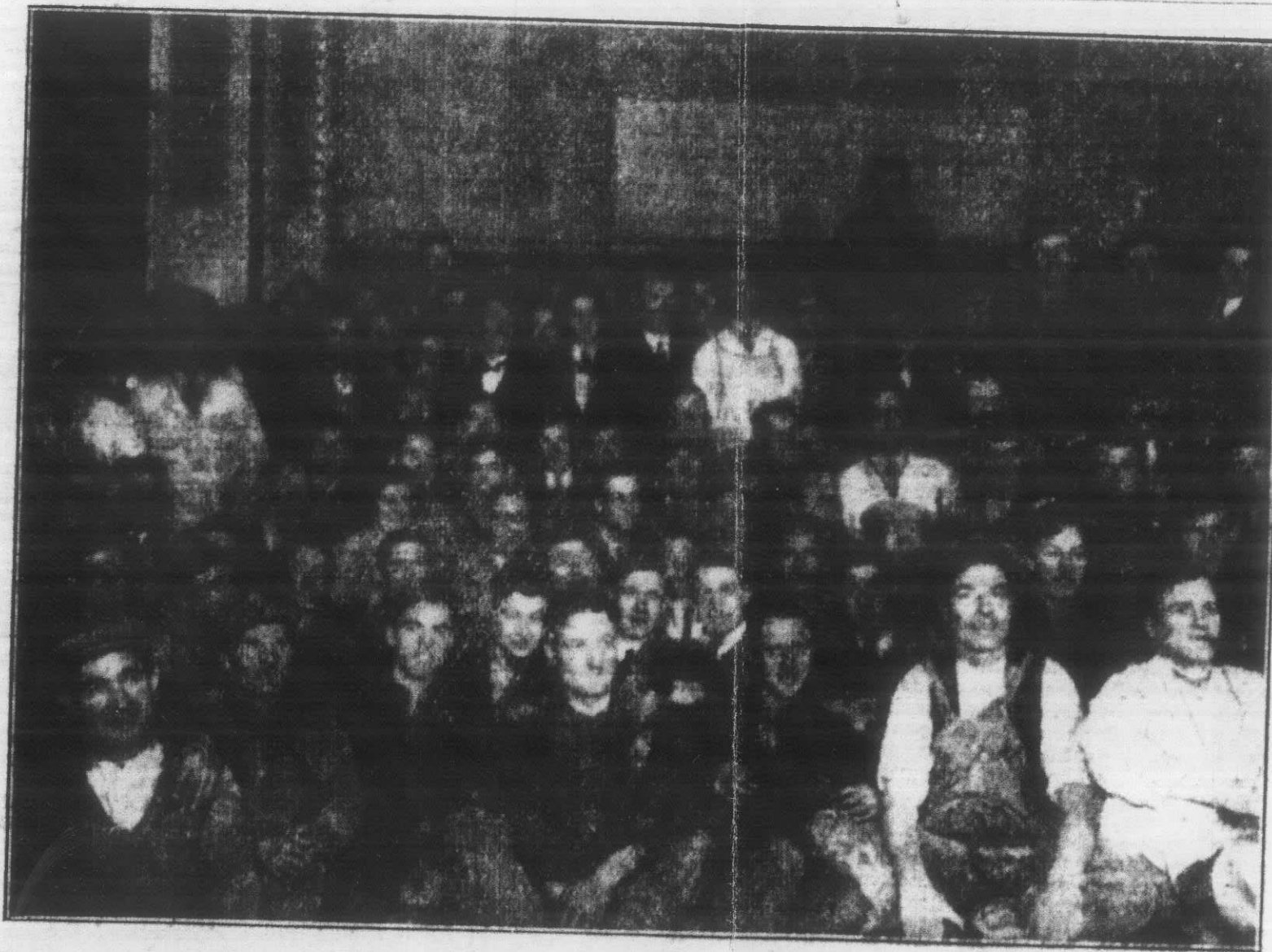
Complainant gave evidence of having examined defendant's motor car on November 2nd, and observed that there was no licence in force for the current year.

In reply to Mr. Kelly, defendant said he had been driving a Crossley car during the month of November, and it was involved in an accident. The car was stored for some time and put in a garage in Limerick. The tax and insurance were quite in order, and he took another car and had the insurance transferred. This car was also taxed. Subsequently he returned it when his car was repaired, and applied for a transfer of the insurance certificate. The insurance company demanded £6 for the transfer and re-transfer of the certificate, but as only one car had been insured all the time he could not see why he should pay anything extra. The court was that he could not get his car taxed without having the insurance certificate, and he was driving it from the garage on November 2nd when he was accosted by complainant. However, the question of the insurance had been settled, and he had now got the car taxed for the two months.

INSURANCE COMPANY CHALLENGED.

Mr. Kelly said they had challenged the insurance company on the demand of £6 for the transferring and re-transferring the certificate, pointing out that the insurance only covered one car—the car was under repair—and that there should be no additional cost. Subsequently the company agreed to re-transfer the certificate without extra payment, and defendant then got out his car. Under the circumstances he (Kelly) would contend that there was no intention on the part of defendant.

OBITUARY

MR. DENIS J. MOLONEY, ABBEYFEALE.

No death in recent years (writes our Abbeyfeale correspondent) has caused such general feelings of regret amongst the people of Abbeyfeale and the adjoining districts of Kerry as that of Mr. Denis J. Moloney, of the West End Hotel, Abbeyfeale. Although ill for more than a week, his death was almost entirely unexpected, and when the end came as a shock to all who knew him as a man who was apparently in the best of vigorous health and activity only a few days previously. The late Mr. Moloney had succeeded to the old and extensive hardware and provision business established by his father, Mr. Michael J. Moloney, towards whom only a few short weeks ago general sympathy was extended on the death of Mrs. Moloney. The deceased had honourably upheld the traditions of the trade which reverted to him for few were more respected in his commercial connections for straightforward and confident dealing. A business man of ability, his trade relations were characterized by an integrity of purpose which commanded the confidence of a large clientele. A generous employer, a friend of the poor and a gentleman possessed of many excellent qualities in social intercourse, his death at the comparatively early age of 52 is very widely and very sincerely regretted. The large funeral procession of motor cars which accompanied the remains from St. John's Hospital, Limerick, to Abbeyfeale, and the immense assemblage of sympathizers who attended from Limerick, Kerry, and North Cork on Sunday when the interment took place in St. Mary's Cemetery, bore evidence of the popular desire to pay tribute to the memory of the deceased and of extending sympathy to his bereaved widow, father and brothers. A number of natural flower wreaths and Mass Card offerings were contributed by members of the family and sympathizing friends.

Justice—I don't think so. The only thing is he was driving without a licence, and what would happen if he was involved in an accident?

Mr. Kelly—We would hold the insurance company liable, because they had no right to demand an extra £6 when they were only covering one car.

The Justice said he would apply the Probation of Offenders Act in this case.

REFUSING TO HALT.

Sergeant Flaherty summoned J. Neville, Askeaton, for refusing to halt when challenged for having no light on a bicycle, and J. Cahallan for aiding and abetting the first defendant.

Defendants did not appear, or were not professionally represented.

Complainant said that both defendants were riding bicycles, and as Neville had no light he called on him to halt. Both defendants rode away without stopping, and although Cahallan had a light he summoned him for aiding and abetting Neville to get away by not stopping and by subsequently denying that he was the person concerned. Neville also denied that he had been riding an unlighted bicycle on the night in question.

Stating that this particular type of offence was becoming too prevalent in his district, Sergeant Flaherty asked the Justice to impose heavy penalties.

Justice—Very well. I will fine Neville £1, and Cahallan 10/-.
