REFUSING TO HALT.

Sergeant Flaherty summoned J. Neville, Askeaton, for refusing to halt when challenged for having no light on a bicycle, and J. Cahallan for aiding and abetting the first defendant.

rot professionally represented. Complainant said that both defendants were riding bicycles, and as Neville had no light he called on him to halt. Both defendants rode away without stopping, and although Cahallan had a light he summoned him for aiding and abetting Neville to get away by not stopping and by subsequently denying that he was the person concerned. Neville also denied that he had been riding an unlighted bicycle on the night in question.
