LIMERICK has a new amenity in the form of a new Grillette, appropriately named "The Talk of the Town," which is attached to the Savoy Cinema and Restaurant, and which was opened to-day. The grillette, which is designed to cater for those who like a quick snack or meal, is capable of accommodating over forty patrons at a time, and provides a much needed facility to the catering amenities of the city.

Designed by Mr. E. A. Newenham, architect, "The Talk of the Town" has a delightful decor in contemporary style. Its counter, at which meals are served to patrons, seated on high swivel is of Australian oak, and this gives every facility for the enjoyment of meals in absolute comfort.

The patrons, whether dining or supping, have a wide choice from an elaborate menu, and whether they desire a full meal or a light snack, they are fully catered for. A feature is that with an impressive array of modern cooking appliances they can actually watch their meals being cooked in an infra-red system which is so efficient that a steak can be perfectly cooked in just one minute. There is a doubly controlled grill, which cooks meat on both sides simultaneously. The general decorative effect is in charcoal grey and maroon, which is most pleasant, and the over all impression is of a bright, gay atmosphere, which certainly should make "The Talk of the Town" live up to its name.
