MEAT SOLD CHEAP **Militant farmers** block main street

Traffic was kept out of the centre of Limerick on Saturday for a time as 20,000 farmers - double the expected number - protested against falling incomes. Farmers and their wives from all over Munster were told that if the presetn demonstrations did not bring satisfactory Government action, they should be prepared to act as they had in 1966 when they blocked the roads in all cities and towns in the country.

The protest march, which

long, included tractors, farm machinery and farmers carrying placards. Some of the placards read: "Chicken costs £1.25, a calf for£1", "1973 Bullock£130 - '74£55", "1973: Cow£120 - '74£50" and "Brussles wake up - Farmers deserve justice." Before the march got underway from St John's Square, a token sale of farm produce, in which farmers sold their produce at the actual price they received, was held. About 120 people purchased meat, potatoes, car-

rots and turnips.

Murphy, Bishop of Limerick in his annual appeal for donations to help pay off the outstanding debt on the new Diocesan College in Corbally. The work on the building is now complete. "The bank interest is, therefore, very great, and it will be to our benefit to reduce the debt as speedily as possible. Otherwise the total payment will be much increase,"said his Lordship. "It is for this reason that I

have asked that the amount contributed by each parish should be increased this year by one third of what it has been in recent years. If this is done and if all continue to support college campaign in other ways, there is every hope that the debt will be fully cleared in five years." So far £300,000 out of the £450,000 has been collected.
