## Shannon: Lowry hits at critics

THE Minister for Transport, Energy and Communications, Michael Lowry, has hit back at critics of Shannon, the the wake of his visit there.

He had flown down to the airport to announce an investment and expansion programme, which would ultimately reach the £50m mark, all going well.

The scheme not only envisaged a major upgrad-

ing of passenger and handling facilities at the air-port, but also the commencement of work, next year, of a major new road system outside the terminal building.

The new programme would have an impact on employment in Limerick area and the Shannon locality.

particular, the Minister has been notably critical of the stance taken by local Dail deputy Tony Killeen, in a statement critical of the government.

A statement from the

Department of Transport, Energy Communications, declared: "Traffic at Shannon is very buoyant, attributable in large part to initiatives taken by mr Lowry over the last five

It added: "Mr Lowry has repeatedly emphasised the need for close attention to cost effectiveness in all the State companies for . which he is responsible."

Minister Lowry himself elaborated: "Aer Rianta is a very successful State company, returning high profits before tax in all recent years - almost £130 million over the last five years. It was £37.5 million, last year.

"The company is projecting continuing high profits for the next five

years."

He pointed out: "Traffic at Shannon increased by 18% for the first half of this year, over the corresponding period, last year.

"All the indications are that the growth figure for the full year, 1996, will be even higher.

"Financing the development programme for Shannon — £23.5 million over the years to 2001 is well within the capability of Aer Rianta." But he emphasised: "It

is not correct to give the impression that there is no EU funding for Shannon." The Minister elaborated:

"The transport Operational Programme 1994-1999 provides for European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) assistance towards total expenditure of £38 million at the three State-owned airports.

'Allocation of this ERDF aid between the three airports is kept under close and continuing review by Aer Rianta, in the light of traffic and other developments."
