

Training Sessions the St. Columcille will Continue during March

# AER LINGUS-IRISH FIRST JUMBO JET AT SHANNON

THE giant B747 aircraft St. Columcille, the first Aer Lingus-Irish Jumbo jet, is based at Shannon since Tuesday last for training exercises and will remain there until March 29. It will be engaged on three training details daily: from 8 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.; 1.30 p.m. to 6 p.m. and 7 p.m. to 11.30 p.m. Each detail will cater for eight crew, and in all, some sixty to sixty-five crews will be involved in the exercises.

Minister for Transport and Power, Mr. Brian Lenihan, T.D.; Mr. Patrick Lynch, Chairman, Aer Lingus-Irish; Mr. Michael Dargan, General Manager; and a large gathering of representatives of Irish travel, tourism, aviation and commerce. The "St. Columcille" touch-down at its home base, Dublin Airport, was heralded by a fanfare from the No. 1 Army Band and the ceremonial hoisting of the national airline's house flag on a special stand of colours overlooking the airport ramp. The growth of the national airline was dramatically illustrated by the sight of a tiny five-seater De Havilland "Dragon," waiting near the end of Dublin Airport's main runway to lead the giant B747 to its parking area at the terminal.

A group of hostess instructors have been trained with an American airline and fifteen hostesses are at present in training at the Boeing Company works in Seattle. A special mock-up of the Boeing 747 has been built in the hostess training quarters at Dublin Airport and to date some 122 hostesses have been trained here. Further training will be carried out on the new aircraft before its introduction into service. By the end of June about 450 hostesses will have completed Boeing 747 training. Project groups visited London Airport to observe Boeing 747 handling; training seminars are currently in operation for clerical and operative staff; training in driving and operating 747 equipment is in operation at Dublin and Shannon; sales and reservations training is under way in Dublin, Belfast, Cork and Limerick. The St. Columcille training exercises involve simulated loading, unloading, cabin service, cleaning, passenger boarding and equipment positioning. Also included are 8-hour simulated flights during which meals and drinks will be served to a number of volunteer passengers—all airline staff.

The ground are already seated twice as high as the Wright brothers' aircraft flew in 1903. The first ever aeroplane flight at Kitty Hawk (North Carolina) in 1903 covered just over half the length of the cabin of a B747 (120 feet). The passenger entrances are approximately 17 feet above the ground. The 47,200 gallons of fuel in a Boeing 747 would power the average family car (if it used kerosene) for just over 100 years. As heating fuel it would keep a four-bedroom house warm for about 44 years. Nevertheless it takes only thirty minutes to fuel a Boeing 747 for a transatlantic crossing. The approximate fuel consumption on an Atlantic crossing is 20,000 gallons (90 tons).

On Friday, March 5, the St. Columcille, the first of two Jumbo jets ordered by Aer Lingus-Irish, took off from Snohomish County Airport, thirty miles north of Seattle, and after a few hours stop at Shannon, left on the final stage of its delivery flight to Dublin. The \$10 million, 38-seater aircraft was piloted by the airline's chief pilot, Captain P. E. Little. Also on the flight deck were Captain Gordon Wade, Chief of Flight Standards; two other pilots and a navigator. The aircraft was met by the

### Training

For the past 18 months intensive training has been carried out by Aer Lingus to ensure that flight and ground crews obtained the operational and technical information necessary to handle the 747. Courses were arranged at the Boeing Company Service School in Seattle and at various vendor equipment service schools in the United States and Great Britain. This training covered all systems relating to aircraft, power plant, electrical and avionic equipment. In addition,

### In flight

Take-off and landing distances for the 747 are comparable to those for the 707. The 747 cruises at an altitude of 35,000 feet (7 miles), at 560 miles per hour. Its speed is only slightly greater than the 707, permitting a close integration of the schedules for both aircraft. It has a maximum take-off weight of 710,000 lbs. (318 tons), thus permitting a maximum payload of 146,000 lbs. or 73 tons. It is the world's heaviest commercial aircraft. It carries a crew of three pilots and fifteen air hostesses. In its all-economy version, it carries 585 passengers in nine-abreast seating. In mixed configuration it accommodates 24 first class passengers and 342 economy class passengers. Its cargo and baggage holds measure 5,800 cubic feet, more than three times as great as the Boeing 707.

### Navigation

The three inertial navigation systems of the Boeing 747, first developed for space flight, each incorporate small computers which start as the aircraft taxis to the runway. The flight plan is programmed before each flight. Information on the aircraft's position and changes in the flight plan should be effected are supplied without interruption to the autopilot while in flight, as well as position and other data to the flight instruments. What could take a navigator 20 minutes to calculate is supplied by the computer in one-twentieth of a second.

### Dimensions

Compared to the largest aircraft at present operated by Aer Lingus, the 167 seat B707, the new aircraft is 78 feet longer, 21 feet higher and 50 feet wider. The aircraft is manufactured in ten major sections and has approximately 4,200,000 parts. It contains 100 miles of cables and wires. The flight deck contains 135 instruments, apart from indicator lights and controls. There are 18 wheels, 16 on the main gear and two on the nose-wheel. It is possible to steer the main wheel gear as well as the nose-wheel gear. In spite of this the 747 needs a turning circle 100 yards in diameter. Two Boeing 747 flights could carry almost all the passengers carried by Aer Lingus in 1968-1969, its first year of operation. The length of the Boeing 747 is 33 feet more than the height of Liberty Hall, Dublin. The entire population of an Irish village would fit in a Boeing 747. It could accommodate everybody in Ashford or Fenit, Co. Kerry, or in a still have room for a few neighbours, friends and visitors.

### Interior decor

The interior of the Boeing 747, is divided into five zones or compartments, four of them named after the four provinces of Ireland, and the fifth after Tara, the ancient seat of the High Kings of Ireland. The panels which decorate the partitions, carry the arms of the provinces imposed on reproductions of John Speed's seventeenth century maps of the provinces. The colour schemes in all compartments reflects the soft colours of Ireland, the greens, browns and gold, creating a warm, comfortable, yet sophisticated interior. Throughout the aircraft, side panels, fabrics, screens and partitions feature Irish design, a thousand years old, with motifs drawn from Carrickmacross lace, Celtic scroll patterns, traditional costumes and traditional stone wall constructions. The panels, with their maps and coats of arms, flip over to act as cinema screens. For those who prefer to travel without movie entertainment, the Uster Room is available. The Tara Room accommodates 24 first class passengers. It is fitted for both audio and visual entertainment. Meals are served from a bar in the centre. Headrest covers, table napkins and tray mats in the first class compartment are made of Irish linen. The de luxe cutlery are of Irish design and manufacture. First class passengers have access to an upper deck state room at the top of an elegant winding staircase. Here passengers can relax and enjoy a drink from a cocktail bar. The state room is furnished with comfortable lounge-style chairs. The Uster Room accommodates 56 economy passengers. It has audio but no visual entertainment. The Connacht, Leinster and Munster Rooms accommodate 92, 78 and 116 passengers, respectively. All have both audio and visual entertainment. There are 12 toilets and seven galleys on the Boeing 747. There are 10 doors on the aircraft.
