Shannon poem is republished

Priomhshruth Eireann (The Principal River of Ireland), a poem composed by Michael O Braonain, from Roscommon, has been republished by Limerick Corporation in association with other local authorities along the Shannon.

The poem, which is in bilingual form, contains over 350 placenames. It traces the Shannon from Cavan to Kerry. Michael Smith, Minister for the Environment, opened the seminar. The delegates from various counties were welcomed to Limerick by Cllr John Quinn, deputy mayor.

200 year old poem republished

A SEMINAR celebrating the republication of a lengthy poem about the Shannon, 200 years after it was composed, is being held next weekend, May 20-21, in Jury's Hotel.

Written by Roscommonborn Micheál O Braonáin in 1794, "Príomhshruth Eireann", now published both in modern Irish and English translation, gives an account

of the river, its tributaries and mentions over 350 placenames along its banks.

For these reasons, the Placenames Commission at the Ordnance Survey Office felt that it should be translated and republished and thus made available to the general public.
