ASKEATON

A ROAD which will allow traffic by by-pass Askeaton and alleviate congestion in the town will cost about £500,000, it was stated at the monthly meeting of Limerick County Council.

A traffic study has been carried out in the late 1960's, and this revealed that 75 per cent of vehicles entering the town represented "through traffic".

Aged 66 years. In manner, he was courteous, obliging. In announcing the Word of God, he was simple, eloquent, affecting. He laboured to augment the Kingdom of Heaven. May it be his place of everlasting rest. Amen."

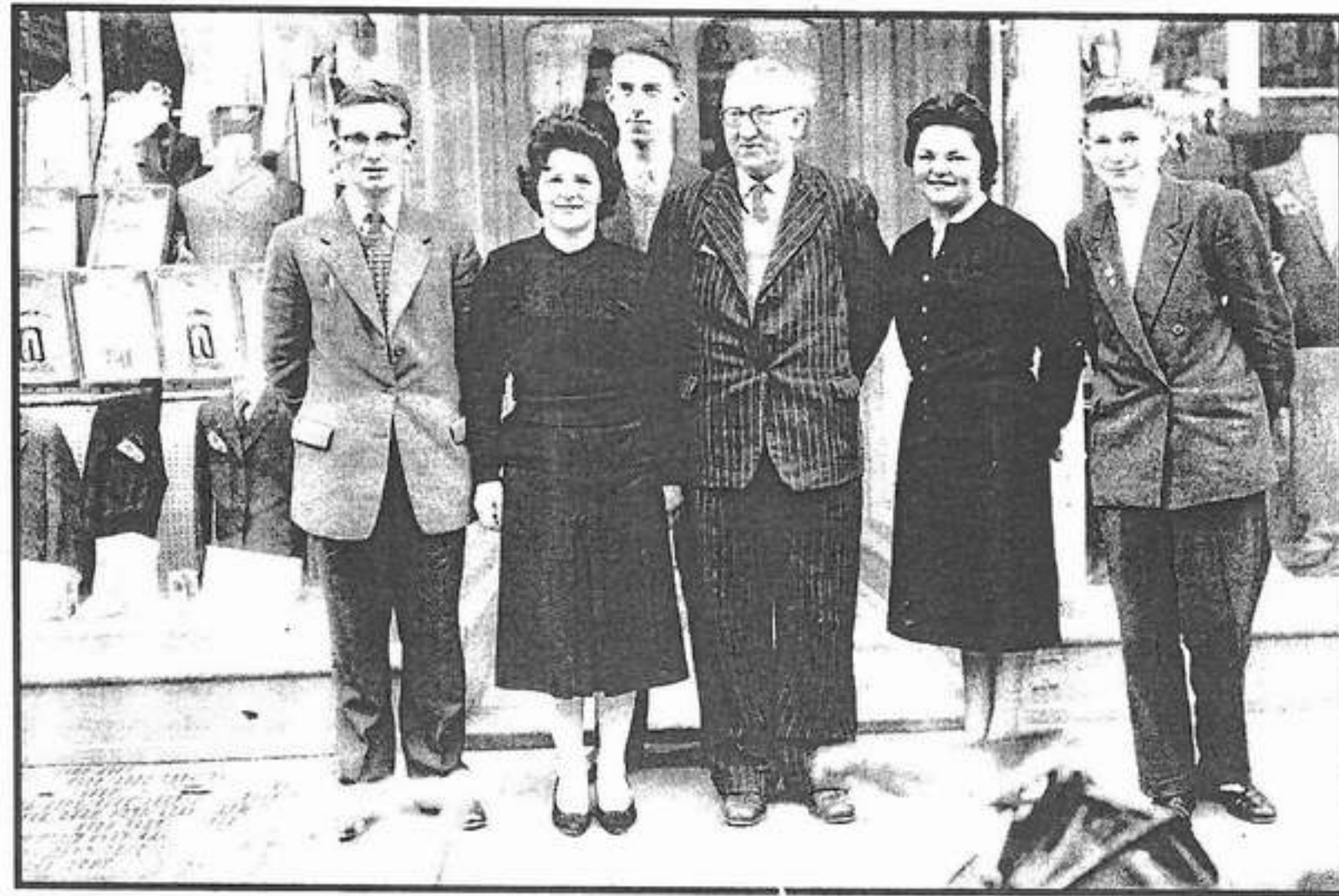
