"The end result is that sidents are left in limbo land nce the contractor leaves - in ther words they have no-here to turn to have faults ectified".

A spokesman for Limerick ounty Council agreed that roblems were often created nce a contractor left a site.

More often than not the ond lodged by the contractor not sufficient to meet the ost of the repair work.

Back to Dr. O'Flaherty: The principal sources of con-ern to residents are lack of dequate lighting, pot holes on the roads, unfinished footpaths and roads, and rubble strewn all over the site.

He called for tougher action against builders who were not prepared to fulfill the terms of their contracts.

His sympathy, he con-tinued, rested with the unfortunate people who had in-vested their life savings in providing a roof over their

"They entered a contract with the best of intentions and it is regrettable that unscrupu-lous builders should take advantage of them", con-tinued Dr. O'Flaherty.

It was unfortunate, he said, that some should give the building industry a bad name.
"These are difficult times for the industry."

for the industry and it needs

every encouragement it can get - those who are long established thrive on their reputation and generally leave a site to the satisfaction of all concerned".

His criticism, he concluded, was levelled at those who sprung up overnight and were not prepared financially to take on major contracts.
