BEEF CLASSIFICATION GRID CHANGES

Carcase Classification has been changed over to the European Grid recently. The letters I.R.E.L.A.N.D. are no longer applied, the number of fat scores are reduced to five from seven.

The new scheme is classifying stock into the following letters EUROP with last letter P subdivided into three parts A.B.C. The new fat scores are one to five with the fat score of four divided into two parts, 4L for low 4 and 4H for High 4 fat score.

The new "5" fat score which is now equal to the old 6 and 7 score is not eligible for intervention.


The current intervention prices are broken up in four parts; as follows:-

Pence per Ib

(1) Steer 1X Grades E.U.R. 1 to L4 91.4p (2) Steer 1 Grades EURO 1 to L4 89.9p (3) Steers 2X Grades EUR 1 to H4 88.6p (4) Steers 2 Grades EURO 1 to H4 87p

On the average run of Bullocks 89.2p would be the price obtained for steers on the current Intervention prices. As only half the total kill is allowed into intervention at present, 50% has to be marketed. As usual, the market place will decide the returned price of steers over the next few months. At 89.2p per lb., the equivalent of £52.60 per cwt. live, Intervention is now by far the best price available. Should markets slip further, the producer should be demanding full intervention now to cushion the £60 to £70 per cwt. store he purchased a few months back.

PRESIDENTIAL VISIT

A building that was erected in 1785 and whose walls at respective times were accustomed to the chains of housed prisoners and listening to the verdicts of judges, entered a totally new era on Sunday, July, 4th. This was when the country's first citizen - President Hillery officially opened Rathkeale Community Centre.

This magnificent building in the town square has been reconstructed at a cost of £100,000 and will be a major asset to the community. It manifests clearly the capabilities of the people of Rathkeale.

WELCOME

To celebrate this eventful occassion the local community council organised a first class welcome. This has been a most colourful year in the history of Rathkeale. The banners and flags have been at full mast all summer because of the Novena, Presidential visit and finally, the staging of Limerick Community Games, all in Rathkeale.

The 14th Infantry Battalion of the F.C.A., (with our own Neddie Roche to the fore) formed a guard of honour. This guard of honour was first inspected by Jimmy Hayes and when he gave the 'okay' all was in readiness for his excellency.

Also present in a guard of honour were the boy scouts, girl guides and the local fire crew. The army band provided delightful music for the large crowd assembled.

Address

In his address President Hillery said of the provision of a community centre:-

"The effort which the task demands is doubly rewarding. It provides a useful and lasting amenity and gives the community a renewed faith in itself".

He went on: "The common purpose, the shared work, the sacrifice made together of leisure and resources, the willing effort of each in the common cause of all awaken a realisation of the interdependence of all of us and an awareness of the immesurable potential for achievement of a closely-knit community, when it directs all its energies and talents towards the realisation of an objective which it considers worthy of a special effort."

"You have demonstrated your great spirit and proved your worth. What you have accomplished bears testimony to your vision, determination and faith in the future of this community" he said to great applause.

"This centre is a monument to co-operation and to your faith in yourselves and in your community. It will, with all facilities, be an enduring boon to Rathkeale for generations to come. Not least important, it will stand as a reminder, now and for the future, to young and old, of what Rathkeale has accomplished, an incentive, too, to fresh endeavour in kindred fields."

Blessed

The centre was blessed by the Very Rev. Thomas Canon Costelloe, P.P., Rev. John McKay and Rev. Ellen Walley.

Canon Costelloe also spoke on what he described as "very special and historic occasion." It was a great joy to have a President make a first official visit to Rathkeale. The community centre, he said, would prove to be a source of great enrichment and enjoyment to all the people of the area.

The chairman of the Rathkeale Community Council, Mr. Patrick Johnson, paid tribute to President Hillery for coming to Rathkeale to open the centre, which would provide facilities for "so many people and so many organisations".

Restoration

Mr. Haslam emphasised that not only were they attending the opening of a community centre but also celebrating the restoration - the rescue of an historic building by courageous civic-minded citizens.

"It is little more than a decade since the building seemed doomed when it became dangerous, and thanks to the splended efforts of the community council and with some help from other sources such as Limerick County Council and also ANCO-I am glad to say it has been restored and refurbished."

Commented Mr. Haslam: "It is pleasing to reflect that the future use of the building provides so marked a contrast to the past. No longer will it house unfortunate prisoners or trembling litigants - apart from use during elections - but rather a centre for all to enjoy themselves."

"A special mention must be made of the facilities specifically provided for the senior citizens, and I am glad that it was also possible to provide accommodation for Civil Defence Headquarters."

The people of Rathkeale and in particular the Community Council can attribute themselves a clap on the back for their worthwhile efforts, and a job well done.



Bound for Mosney




John Woulfe (seen here receiving his gold medal from Seamus Cleary, Community Games Director) won the Long Puck event.

Eleven year old John is a son of Mossie and Mary Woulfe and has two younger brothers - 'Chester' and Michael and a younger sister - Mary.


The strongly built John is a fine all round sportsman excelling in field games, soccer, hurling and football and on courses such as pitch and putt and tennis.


His other interests and hobbies include soccer, reading, cycling and eating. His Mother tells us he particularly enjoys the latter activity.



CELEBRATION



•Shannon CORNED BEEF AND PINEAPPLE

4 Portions

212g, (7½ oz) can of Shannon Corned Beef. 1½ oz. butter 4 slices of pineapple 1½ Roasted almonds, chopped

Method

11/2 oz. Icing sugar

Heat up fairly thick slices of corned beef in butter and a little canned pineapple juice. Brown the sugar to the amber caramel stage, stir in the pineapple juice, reduce and heat the slices of pineapple in this syrup. Place a slice of pineapple on each slice of Corned Beef and coat with the syrup blended with whipped cream. Sprinkle with the chopped almonds and serve preferably with curry rice.

Ideal when you want a speedy and substantial hot meal

425 g (15 oz) can of Shannon Corned beef, roughly chopped

1 onion, chopped 1 clove garlic, crushed 2-3 sticks celery, finely chopped (optional) 400g (14 oz) can tomatoes

1/2 beef stock cube
I teasp. paprika pepper
salt and pepper
4-5 potatoes, cooked and sliced

Set oven Gas Mark 6 200°C (400°F)

Method:

Put the chopped meat into a medium-sized baking dish. Add the onion, garlic, and celery. Drain the can of tomatoes, reserve the juice. Add the tomatoes to the dish. Cover the dish with the sliced potatoes. Brush the potatoes with a little oil and bake in the pre-set oven for 30 minutes until the potatoes are nice and crisp. Serve with a green salad.
