AFTER 17 years the Limerick Soccer Club has won its first major competition. In a devastating recovery at Dundalk yesterday the Limerick team transformed forlorn hope into triumph to win the Shield by scoring three goals in as many minutes, and finishing 3-2 victors over the Dundalk side.
