WARNING IGNORED.

Despite, warnings from Tunisian U.N. troops the journalists made their way to the danger zone and in an outburst of machine gun fire Taylor was shot dead.

It is believed that the shooting was done by Lumumba forces, as the opposing forces have got no mechanised weapons.

TO MAKE VIGOROUS PROTEST.

The United States Ambassador in the Congo is awaiting a detailed, report of the shooting before making a protest to Prime Minister Lumumba.

The late Mr. Taylor is a son of the United States Ambassador to Switzerland. He is the first journalist to lose his life in the Congo fighting, which is assuming the proportions of a civil war.
