Mulvey's hat-trick stole the show

FINNEY NOT TO JOIN LIMERICK

Limerick, 5; Donie Wallace's Se., 1.
BEATING the pick of Cork by 5-1 in the Joe Casey/Des McNamara benefit game at the Markets Field yesterday, Limerick, assisted by Tom Finney and Tommy Hamilton, showed very definite touches of class, and held out hope that they are going to be a very strong force next season.

Finney, of course, was the big attraction for the 3,000 or more spectators, but it was inside-right Eddie Mulvey who collected top honours, with a splendid hat-trick.

This was a new Mulvey, a player who, for a change, found the ball running his way, and he cashed-in with three grand goals. His third effort, a very fine header, could have been disallowed for "offside", but it would have been a great pity, indeed.

Another player who collected top honours, no longer a ninety minute performer at top-speed, did pretty much as he pleased, when he wanted to make the effort. His ball control was delightful, and he could easily have added to his second-half goal. Time and again he slipped the ball to an unmarked colleague when it seemed that he could have scored without exerting himself.

Hopes that Finney might sign for Limerick next season were dashed after the game. The 76-times "capped" England and Preston star told me: "When I retired because of a groin injury, I told Preston I would not play for any other club. I still enjoy playing very much, but will only figure in games of this kind in future".

Another player that Limerick were said to be interested in, Shamrock Rover's Tommy Hamilton, too, treated the big attention to some very fine flashes. Hamilton, skat of Shamrock Rovers F.A.J. Cup winner, liked the outing, said he: "The game was played in holiday spirit, and all the players seemed to enjoy it".

KEEPER IN FORM
Donie Wallace's selected found the home keeper, Kevin Fitzpatrick on top of his form, and the forwards could make little head-way, too, against the Limerick halves, Des McNamara, Dennis Linnane and Ewan Fenton. Linnane, playing only his second game with the "firsts", did exceptionally well.

Dick O'Connor had some excellent moments on the right wing for the winners, but in the second-half he overdid the shooting from "impossible" positions.

The losers were best served on the wings. Donie Wallace and Paul O'Donovan, great favourites with the Limerick public, were quite dangerous, but were given little rope by Tony Brosnan and Joe Casey.

Hamilton's left-wing partner, Frank Johnson had some good tussles with Pat O'Mahony. Lane were prominent in the losers' defence.

THE SCORING
In the tenth minute, Mulvey put Limerick ahead, after good work by Fenton and Hamilton. Eight minutes later Fenton was again prominent, placing Mulvey to beat Derry Buckley with his left foot. Almost immediately Donie Wallace left Kevin Fitzpatrick helpless with a powerful free.

In the 26th minute Mulvey completed his hat-trick after being pinned by O'Connor.

Hamilton and Des McNamara paved the way for O'Connor to beat Buckley in the 38th minute for a grand score, leaving it 4-1 at the interval.

After the woodwork had saved Buckley twice when O'Connor and Finney had him beaten, the "Preston plumber" made no mistake with a ground shot.
