Hamilton for Limerick?

Cork Celtic also interested

TOMMY HAMILTON, ex-Manchester United, and Shamrock Rovers' League of Ireland Soccer Star of 1962, will more than likely sport new colours in the new season, due to open on August 19th (fixtures not yet to hand). Cork Celtic and Limerick are the clubs topping the race for his signature.

It was reported some time ago that Celtic were prepared to figure in an exchange deal with Shamrock Rovers—Hamilton for their international goalkeeper, Kevin Blount. But Rovers have since signed a Dubliner who fractured a leg when showing great promise with Manchester United, and it is unlikely that they will require Blount.

Therefore, the way could now be clear for Limerick to sign Tommy, who starred for them in an exhibition match against Glasgow Celtic, partnering Charlie Tully. He also shone in the benefit game for Joe Casey and Des McNamara at the end of last season.

HERE ON BUSINESS

Tommy Hamilton is due to come South on promotion, and it is possible that he will be based in Limerick, and not Cork, as was originally stated.

Rovers will, of course, ask a stiff price for Hamilton—their cup-winning hero last season who was very nearly left out of the side.

Limerick player-coach Ewan Fernton returns from Blackpool to-day following a refresher coaching course. Already he has notified 21 players to report for training at the Markets Field next Tuesday. Pat Skelly and Eddie Mulvey, both Dublin-based, have also resigned.

Commerce should be taught in every Tech.

THE absolute necessity of having commerce taught in every vocational school in Co. Limerick was stressed at Tuesday's meeting of the Co. Vocational Education Committee which was held in Limerick. It was stated that even the Leaving Certificate is no use unless a girl can go on to take a course at a university.

At the commencement of the meeting it was decided, on the proposition of Mr. Michael Herbert, M.C.C., to hear a deputation, from Cappamore on the subject of having a commerce teacher at the technical school there.

The deputation consisted of Rev. Fr. Morris, C.C., Cappamore, and Mr. S. Hickey, N.T., Cappamore.

HAD TO TRAVEL

Father Morris stated that he was addressing the Committee on behalf of the Parish Priest of Cappamore, who was unavoidably absent. There were about 1,630 people in the parish of Cappamore. The girls of the parish who wished to learn shorthand, typewriting and book-keeping had to travel to Limerick City or Newport, Macra na Feirme also wanted commerce taught in Cappamore.

Mr. Hickey, who spoke entirely in Irish, said that the attendance at the "tech" in Cappamore was falling off "and unless we do something about it, it is likely that the school would not be there at all within two years." Girls had to go elsewhere to learn commerce with the additional burden of travel costs.

SUPPORT

The members of the Committee expressed their wholehearted support for the proposal and it was decided unanimously, on the proposition of Mr. Herbert, Chairman of the Committee, to provide a commerce teacher at the 'tech', and that the new C.E.O., Mr. O'Cuilleain, should make arrangements to have a commerce teacher there when the new term opens.

Mr. C. Keane, M.C.C., said that girls had to learn commerce after obtaining the Leaving Certificate, unless their parents were rich enough to send them on to a university. The first question any girl was asked when
