Limerick's big signing: Fee is £5,000 ANDY McEVOY OF BLACKBURN ROVERS

IMERICK A.F.C. have signed Andy McEvoy, the Republic of Ireland inside-forward, from Blackburn Rovers, the English Second Division Club, for a fee of £5,000 . . . the highest ever paid by a League of Ireland club.

Two Limerick Directors, Jack Tuchy and Michael Toomey, flew out from Dublin Airport to Manchester yesterday to have discussions with Blackburn officials and the 29-year-old International player. And the deal was completed in ninety minutes.

McEvoy is undoubtedly a big "capture" for Limerick, who are hoping that he will be the solution to the front-line problems which have beset BY TONY PURCELL

the side in recent seasons. He was the leading goalscorer in English League football in 1965-'66 season.

One of the conditions of his joining the Munster club is that he will not be transferred back to another English club.

McEvoy has 17 International "caps." In his early days with Blackburn Rovers he played as a wing-half and at one stage was such a great success that he kept his fellow Irishman and International. Mick McGrath, out of the team.

INSIDE FORWARD It was in the inside-forward position, however,

that McEvoy came to the forefront on the International soccer scene, He gained his first cap in 1961 when he played against Scotland at Hampden Park. The last occasion he was selected for his country was in May of this year when he played inside-right against Czechoslovakia in the European Nations'

McEvoy has never played in League of Ireland football. He joined Blackburn from Bray Wanderers, the Leinster Senior League club.

It is understood that McEvoy has been wanting to come back to Ireland for some time. Limerick have been in touch with the player for the past three weeks.

Hopes are high that the Shannonsiders will do

well in the new season, which gets under way on Sunday week, August 20. McEvoy will then make his debut for Limerick.

The Board of Directors are to have talks during this week with a Scottish forward whom they expect will sign as a Player-Coach in succession to Ewan Fenton, the new Manager of Linfield, the Six Co.

Limerick have five new players on their books. They are McEvoy, Brian Delargney, a jjunior International inside-forward from Galway Hibernians; the three Dennehy brothers from Wolfe Tones, Cork, and Willie Mulhall, who played a few matches at inside. forward for Drumcondra last season.
