The Dwindling Pound Sterling

A QUESTION that an al-
deputy might table
answering by the Minister
Industry and Commerce wh
the Dail resumes, is the numb
of applications from manufa
turing firms for permission
increase their prices, and t
number of such applications
has rejected. For the seco
time within a month the
partment of Industry and Co
merce has issued a list of fir
which have been authorised
the Minister to increase the
prices. The last list which w
issued just a week ago, show
that the authorised increas
were, in general, very slight an
there could be no suggestio
that these manufacturers we
intent on making huge profit
The impression conveyed fro
a scrutiny of the list was th
the applicants were mere
trying to offset rising cos
either in wages or raw mate
ials, and obviously they we
able to convince the Minist
that there were very go
grounds on which their claim
were based.

IT will be recalled that th
Prices Order was introduc
in 1965 to control manufac
prices which as a matter
course increased according
every concession to the w
kers by way of wages, short
hours, fringe benefits and
vice pay, all made a conglom
ation of circumstances whi
can perilously near causin
wholesale redundancy among
industrial workers. It took
multiplicity of trade unio
some time before they final
came around to the convic
that there was a limit, whi
if exceeded, would entail a co
plete breakdown in the natio
economy. The many talks b
tween the Federated Union
Employers and the Irish Tra
Union Congress had the help
effect of making that dang
quite clear and one result h
been the withholding of yet a
other round of general wage i
creases. Indeed, important un
executives have come around
the view that it is now far p
ferable that the individu
unions would make their ov
claims than involve the enti
economy in a situation whi
could create havoc amongst t
smaller industries.

IT CAN be assumed, therefo
that the Minister in perm
ting the recent list of price
creases was firmly convinc
of their validity. His annou
