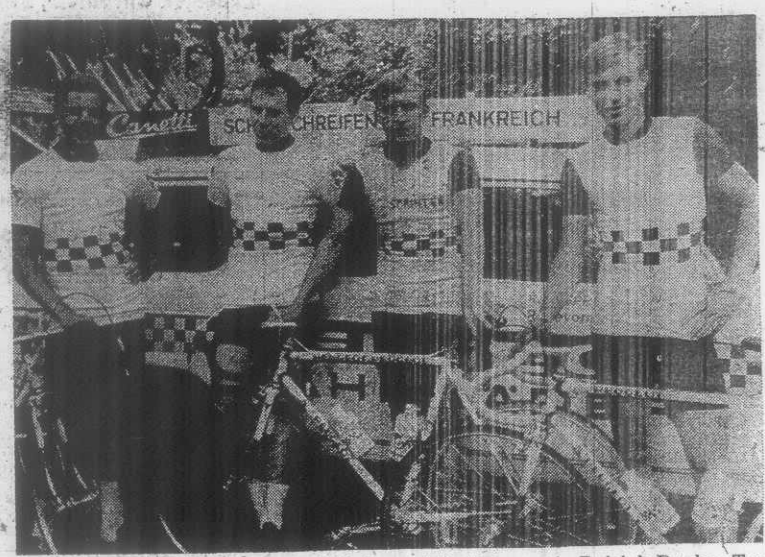

Soccer: Limerick crash to heavy defeat Celtic crash home 6 in facile victory

Ewan Fenton must find new talent

A LOT of factors have to be considered when re-viewing Limerick's crushing 6-0 defeat by Glasgow Celtic at the Markets Field last night.

Before the game, Limerick manager, Ewan Fenton said he was fielding an all-club side so as to have an early opportunity of appraising the talent at his disposal.

What does he think now? Said Ewan—"We were up against the team which I rate the very best in Europe; what could you expect?"

True; Celtic are a great team, although I suppose a few Dutch people might quibble with Ewan's views! But at the same time, I think we could expect a good deal more than we saw from Limerick last night.

And I feel sure that Fenton will agree. No matter what discipline and determination he can put into the team, it must be very clear indeed that the players in action last night are just NOT GOOD ENOUGH.

Again, one must make more limitations—it was the start of the season; the players were not fit, and Al Finucane, who I feel sure would have been a big steady influence, was an absentee.

DOUBLE FIGURES

The excellent goalkeeping of Kevin Fitzpatrick, the woodwork, some sympathetic refereeing and the downright good

fortune saved the score from going into double figures. And remember it was the start of the season for Celtic, too. They shayed the posts on countless occasions, hit the woodwork four times, and brought some tremendous saves out of Fitzpatrick. Twice Lennox had the ball in the net, once quite clearly off-side, another when it must have been very borderline indeed.

SCORES

Tommy Gemmill, with a typical 30-yarder, put the Celts ahead after 23 minutes, and just before the interval John Hughes made it two. It was all Celtic in the second half. Hood scored the third before Gemmill scored from the penalty spot after Hay was brought down by Quinn. Another mistake by Quinn let in Victor Davidson for number five and Lennox finished it off. a polished Joe O'Mahony, who will go far this year if he maintains this standard. Joe Bourke brought off some useful tackles on John Hughes, but aimless clearances ruined it all.

Vinny Quinn policed Jimmy Johnstone well in the first half, but like the majority of his team-mates, faded badly in the second, and must be faulted for Celtic's fifth goal.

Ramon Heffernan, up to his 40th minute injury, and replacement Sean Byrnes tried hard but without much success against these super-fast Celts who were yards quicker to the ball.

Agreed, why wouldn't they, fully trained pros, against early season part-timers, but I think we could have had a bit more of an effort from our men.

The forward line was weak in the extreme. One or two deft touches revealed McEvoy's stature, but he was out of it for long stretches, and his midfield partner, Paddy Shortt, fell away after a bright start.

Shamie Coad was a big disappointment, and the three front runners, Fitzgerald, Meaney and Doran, looked out of their depth completely.

One hates to be too critical; early in the season and the opposition was world-class; we can never here in Limerick aspire to their level of professionalism. But I do feel that a lot more could have been put in by Limerick last evening, and I venture to say that unless new blood and a great more spirit are introduced before the season gets too old, then the sidebook will look very bare indeed next May.
