Limerick qualified for the final of the Dublin City Cup the hard way and there were seenes of wild enthusiasm when they returned home with the trophy after beating fancied Druncondra 43 in a thrilling finst in Dublin.

Gerry McCarthy was later transferred to Charlton Athat a fee reported to be in the region of £2000, Much of the credit for Limerick's triumph was apportioned to Dubliner, Harry McCue, known as the Gentleman of Irish Soccer.
