Al Finucane parts company with Limerick

THE JOKE IS OVER for Limerick. Their handling of the Al Finucane affair was not in keeping with what one would expect from a League of Ireland Club and has left a very sour taste. A veil of secrecy surrounded this week's hurried transfer to Waterford, and even the great Agatha Christie Herself would have had difficulty in trying to unravel the mystery

Never before in the history of the LOI can there have been such a strange transfer saga.
