JOHNSON SPEAKS

DEPOSED Limerick AFC manager, Frank Johnson, this Friday spoke out for the first time on the circumstances surrounding his departure from the club. "I feel I have been wronged, and I just want to put the record straight." he said.

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Johnson claimed that he was ousted as part of a power game by certain people. "I was advised some weeks ago that my future with the club was at stake and that the management had a specific person in mind for the job as manager, but nonetheless, it came as a surprise to me when I was

but nonetheless, it came as a surprise to me when I was more or less told that my terms couldn't be met."

The ex-boss stated that he asked for £30 per week for the new season. "I estimated that I lost £20 per week in overtime earnings at my job since I took over at the Markets Fleid last October, and the same would apply from September onwards. I asked the chairman, Mr. Webb, to compensate me for losing out on overtime and that I should

compensate me for losing out on overtime and that I should be given an additional £10 wages, making a total of £30. He told me that in no way could the club meet these terms and that was that."

Johnson claimed that his bonus money for getting Limerick to the Cup final in May and the Munster Cup decider was £20. "I didn't crib, but at the time I felt I was worth more. That was one of the reasons I had to take a stand for the new season. I wanted a contract and, if granted,

there could have been come-back."

He expressed his annoyance
at the way he was allowed to
depart. "On the night we were
to discuss my terms I was left

He pointed out that during

last season he was on the same terms as the players: £12 for a win; £9 for a draw and £6 if the team lost, "Surely as manager I was entitled a little more? I didn't argue the issue because my first priority was to get the club back on its_feet."

During the past week Johnson was the recipient of much sympathy from soccer fans. But, according to himself, he is long enough in the game to accept that when the new season kicks off his achievements will be just a memory. "At first I felt like coming out into the open on the way in which I had been treated but decided that it wouldn't have been worth it. I left in the knowledge that I had done a reasonably good job; tried to please everybody and made no enemies. The players gave me everything they had, gave me everything they had, and it is my fervent wish that honours will come their way in 1977-78".
