Euro grant for NIHE

THE EEC has given a joint grant of £168,000 to NiHE. Limerick and the IIRS for research into the development of a fluidised bed technique for the burning of coal and other fuels. The intention is to develop a small scale boiler principle, chapable of burning variable quality fuels and able to supply hot water for the small industrial and commercial unit and even for households.
